

NEWS FROM STONEYWISH Easter is over and the year is hurtling on. The great lime tree which hangs over our house has put out leaves which will soon expand to fill the sky. Goodbye sunshine, we grumble. But we do not grumble for long for this tree is a whole world on our doorstep. The inner bark of its smaller branches, (the same bast that Russian peasants used for centuries to make their woven shoes), provides our local squirrels with weaving material for their nests. Lime bark has been harvested and soaked and the fine fibres used to make cordage since Mesolithic times. Man's first fishnets, harnesses, and construction ropes were made from filaments such as these. Britain's rare native lime, of which we are lucky enough to have two on the Reserve, is actually called Tilia Cordata - cord lime - string tree. After the leaves, come the aphids. Anyone who has parked a car beneath a lime tree in summer, will be dismayed to find it covered in the thick honeydew that drips from thousands of aphids feasting in the canopy above. These aphids are a vital food source for brood-rearing birds. The honeydew is also food for ants, bees and certain butterflies. Next comes the blossom. The self-pollinating flowers of lime trees appear in June and July five creamy petals per bloom, suspended in delicate clusters from pale green bracts. The flowers smell of honey, and provide a medicinal tea for humans, but for bees their nectar is quite literally the drink of the gods. Irre-

sistible! I have known this tree hum aloud with bees on a sunny day, its green vault resonating like a bell. In autumn, the sugar-rich leaves turn golden and the first week of November they fall, filling the house, briefly, with reflected light. Nests which have been hidden by foliage all summer, are finally exposed to view. The nursery stands bare once more till spring. To live with this tree is to share in its mysterious energy. The moon rises behind its branches and the wind groans through them. It breathes. It is a tireless giver and teacher. Owls roost in it. Bats hunt round it. Imagine what secrets must be hidden from the casual observer. Is a tree ever just a tree? Even when it is dead it goes on being home and larder to innumerable creatures. Trees offer the continuity which holds whole ecosystems together. Their time is slow, though they are bound to the sun in a dance of perpetual change. Now scientists tell us what our mythmaking ancestors suspected all along: that trees can talk to one another, feel pain, support companion trees... Isn't it time we stopped thinking of them as furniture in a passive landscape, inert and expendable? It might be, for humans, a small but vital step towards a new understanding of our planet home: seeing the complexity and the wholeness, without which, extinctions are simply a matter of course.

hatching. The rush is relentless! Summer's hedgerows are already heady with honeysuckle and roses. Bluebells give way to campions. Campers dream of frost-free nights...

One last thing: the Russian lime-bast shoes lasted approx. 12 days before they wore out and had to be replaced, so plaiting new lapti was a peasant's constant task. However the old ones must never be thrown away. They were hung outside the cottage as protection against evil. In his old age, the novelist and aristocrat, Leo Tolstoy, taught himself to make lapti, 'demeaning' himself to engage in the tradition which had bound man and forest together as long as anyone could remember. The lapti disappeared, together with the peasants who wore them, in the early 20th century. The story of Tolstoy's 'stunt' however, returns with a richer message. On which note... Michael has just come home with news that he has heard the cuckoo. Hurrah!

I learned a lot, including finding out about Orchard Gardens "a rendezvous of thousands and one of the most famous pleasure grounds in the South East" with its boating lake and links of the village with Vera Brittain, Donald Sinden, Paul Scofield and Dirk Bogarde and a canteen providing hot midday meals 5 days a week at Keymer Church for evacuees of the Second World War. On page 41, the book talked about the Stafford Legacy. "Mr Stafford was an important benefactor who handed over Villa Adastra to the Salvation Army for an Eventide Home and Stafford House to the county education authority as a youth centre.

Surely I cannot be the only one to wonder how a youth centre, presumably gifted for the benefit of local children, has now become a development of very expensive houses and flats. Have some people gained masses of money for their own pockets in the intervening years?

Does anyone wonder why the youngsters in the village are at a loose end in the evenings when the land formerly playing fields and buildings left for their benefit by Mr Stafford, are now privately owned homes?

Assuming the book reflects what has happened in this village, I do not rate this as progress.

ACTION FOR CLIMATE CHANGE IS NOW HIGH ON THE COUNTY AGENDA In April, West Sussex County Council unanimously agreed to do more to combat climate change and work towards making the County Council carbon neutral by 2030. HKD Transition and its fellow members of the South East Climate Alliance had hoped that the Council would have made this an unconditional pledge. We were also disappointed that WSCC decided not to join the increasing number of local authorities and most recently, the UK Parliament, who have declared that we are living in a time of 'climate emergency'. As our local County Councillor, Kirsty Lord, pointed out, with the average carbon footprint of a West Sussex resident well above the UK average, action is needed now. However, the debate was positive, with cross-party unanimity. Councillors called for decisive leadership including the appointment of an Advisory Board which would keep a watchful eye on the effect of Council actions on its carbon footprint and consult with local communities and businesses.

The emphasis on partnership and consultation tempted HKD Transition to flatter itself by wondering if its own recent work had influenced Councillors. Over recent months we produced a discussion paper 'What would a carbon neutral West Sussex look like in 2030 and what can we do now to help to get there?' It was discussed in detail with Kirsty Lord before the debate, and is now in the hands of Cabinet Member, Deborah Urguhart. It paints a picture of a carbon neutral County and suggests ways by which this could be achieved. (Details on www.hkdtransition.org.uk) Inevitably, the discussion paper is concerned with the big changes that need to be made. Over the next months, HKD Transition will be concentrating on small steps that can be taken by ordinary folk. Expect a range of 'meet ups' to discuss a whole range of possibilities - some new, some old, and some astonishing. How about scrubbing out your bird feeders for starters?



DDWI Sue introduced our speaker, Barbara Ehlers, who was here to talk to us about her work as a Silversmith. She has a studio on Ditchling Common, where she makes sterling silver jewellery and gifts. She treated us to an interesting and entertaining talk about the long history of silver. She told us that silver is claimed to be antibacterial and used to be regarded as a symbol of wealth, hence the expression "born with a silver spoon in the mouth". She took us through the history of hallmarks and their origins, and told us about the melting point of various metals. She explained how she made beautiful silverware, plus jewellery such as rings, bracelets, earrings and necklaces. She emphasised that when cleaning silver, only soft cloths should be used, and, you should not rub too hard, especially with silver plated objects as this can eventually remove the layer of silver, exposing the base metal. She displayed many of her beautiful items, which were much admired.

DEADLY NIGHTSHADE - "A POISON BOUQUET TO STRIKE HIM DOWN" 16th June is Bloomsday, a celebration of the life of James Joyce, whose novel Ulysses follows Leopold Bloom's escapades on that June date in 1904. Throughout Ulysses, Joyce uses flowers to symbolize romance and the lure of the exotic. Aside from fornication Joyce also tackles expiration, hallucination and urination. All of which (well, apart from the urination) remind me of another bloom that will be raising hell around Sussex in June.

Deadly nightshade looks innocent enough. A tall plant with lush leaves and purple, bell-shaped flowers. Later in the year the glossy berries will catch your eye; dangling temptingly like black pearls. It's in the plant family Solanaceae; related to potatoes and tomatoes. But deadly nightshade isn't the sort of relative you'd invite round for dinner. And you certainly wouldn't want it anywhere near the food. It is lethally poisonous.

Its name should be warning enough (and if not, colloquial nicknames such as 'Satan's Rhubarb' and 'Death Cherries' underline the message). In 1597, Elizabethan physician John Gerard warned us 'banish it from your gardens' and steer well clear but we obviously weren't paying attention. An internet search today reveals recent stories of accidental deaths, comatose children and a naked, hallucinating German monk.

It is reported (but possibly exaggerated) that just three



berries will kill you. Symptoms start with a dry mouth, dizziness and urinary retention (ha – so there was a link to urination after all!) and progress to delirium, convulsions and a heartbeat so furious that it can be heard from several feet away. It's all downhill from there. Incredibly, the berries are the safest part of the plant – you wouldn't want to go anywhere near the roots.

Wicked witches would use the berries in a potion to make their broomsticks rise. Wicked women in Venice , looking for a similar reaction in their men, used deadly nightshade eye drops to dilate their pupils. The plant's scientific name belladonna means 'beautiful woman.' The potential side effects of this beautification would later be the answer to the question 'how do you make a Venetian blind?'

Barcombe botanist David Lang tells a tale of a student found staggering the streets drunk and disorderly. Nothing new there – until a police doctor saw his wide eyes and realised he had been poisoned by belladonna. He was rushed to hospital where it transpired that his landlady was trying to extract medicine from the berries and was straining them through the same strainer she was using to make his coffee each morning. You won't get a kick like that in Costa. So, be cautious of this killer as you walk the Downs in June to ensure that your life, which to paraphrase Mr Joyce is already a 'parenthesis of infinitesimal brevity', is not made any briefer.
