**WASPS** Legendary protest singer Woody Guthrie had the slogan 'This Machine Kills Fascists' emblazoned across his guitar. The lead singer of John Peel's beloved Half Man Half Biscuit had 'This Machine Kills Wasps' across his. Fascists and wasps. Equally hated and despised. But while one are a bunch of loathsome invertebrates that should be slapped every time they start to agitate us, I have to confess I have some empathy towards the wasps.

The wasps' world was created way back in April. A single pregnant queen emerged from her winterlong hibernation, flew, fed and founded a new colony. She single-handedly constructed 30 hexagonal homes from chewed-up wood, laid an egg in each and lovingly tended to her new babies which, when grown, became her workers. Through sheer determination, spit and sawdust they enlarged the colony, constructing an impressive, suspended structure. **DOWNSFEST 2022** It is with great sadness that Downsfest will no longer be held again. The Downsfest ambition was to bring entertainment to the community in a festival environment supporting local acts and giving the opportunity of a 'Glastonbury' experience whilst raising funds for St Peter and St James Hospice.

Downsfest is a self-funding scheme and was run by a core team of three, who have collectively dedicated over 3100 hours of their own time, planning and organising the 2022 event. In 2019, the festival ran at a loss, but we decided to try once again, as well as fundraising for St Peter and St James Hospice. In 2019, we gave £1000 to the hospice and this year we managed to raise funds to pay for a days' nursing at the hospice.

Downsfest fixed costs were over £30,000 to put on! Sadly, the ticket sales failed to cover these costs. We did not take anything ourselves for the 3100 hours we collectively spent putting it on, in contradiction to some social media posts.

We sought sponsorship widely and had some great sponsors but not at the level needed for such a big undertaking. We did extensive research in the area and Downsfest was one of



the cheapest events to attend in the locality, especially with the full day onstage music performances and circus program once inside. We have realised we have achieved something amazing with Downsfest 2022. Here are a few examples of feedback from our festivalgoers: "A fantastic local family-friendly music festival", "Great comedy in your backyard, what's not to like", "A real gem of a festival. Friendly, fun and a string of brilliant local acts," "Amazing local musical talent in a great location", "We had the best day at DownsFest! Who knew what amazing local musical talent we have! Loved every minute".

I am so proud and sincerely grateful to all the help and support given by my Downsfest team: Kelly and Nick who were my backbone, and to Sarah as stage manager and Phil, music director and photographer Chris. Also thank you to all the volunteers that helped over the two days.

twice so that it gets enough. When it is hungry it moos, and when it says nothing, it is because its inside is all full up with grass."

We all know this cow. It is a machine of useful, if limited design. It belongs in a modern dairy where its net productivity can be measured and set against its cost effectiveness, its protein content and its carbon hoof-print - an object which may be further reduced to sets of data and finally dispensed with altogether if a better model can be produced. This cow has nothing to say which can be heard or understood in an age of Progress. Progress has seen fit to denigrate it as a dumb beast, then to exploit it as an industrial component and finally to condemn it as a threat to life and health. But this has not always been the way. As the Indian environmentalist Vandana Shiva points out, a free cow, living on her natural diet does not smell. Look closer and you will find that it is greed, and the twin betravals of life imprisonment and synthetic 'food', which produce the stink. Spend time with a cow, if you can find one. She has a liquid eye, slow breath, time, endless time for rumination. She is curious, deep, and, like an elephant, full of wisdom. When





When one of our calves on the farm accidentally drowned some years ago, the mother and her companion cows, stood together at the site for several days in a ritual of mourning that was humbling in its dignity and beauty. Of course, we know that cows are sacred in India, but they were once considered sacred by all peoples with a pastoral tradition. The White Cow appears in mythology as a mother symbol of fertility and abundance. Like the milking-goat whose horn was the cornucopia, (the horn of plenty), she was worshipped across much of the ancient world. Robert Graves tracks the spread of her cult in his study of the Greek Myths. As Io, the white moon-cow, she skipped her way in a gadfly dance from the shores of the Ionian Sea, around the Black Sea to the Caucasus and back via Thrace, Asia Minor, India and Arabia, to Ethiopia. Finally, she travelled down the Nile to Egypt, Libya, and Greece where she was claimed by Hera, Queen of Heaven. Io can be glimpsed in



the moon-goddess legends of many cultures and was also linked with Astarte, Isis and Kali. Today, in traditional pastoral communities, households still venerate their cattle as members of their own extended families. The house-cow represents wealth, health and security, but significantly more. She holds up a mirror to the human heart. In cultures where the dominant feelings are those of gratitude and reverence, her role is that of honoured friend. In cultures dominated by fear and greed, she becomes a mere tool for profit. Her ways are thought too slow. Her wisdom seems irrelevant. Yet, in her native state, a cow is a 'plantbased' miracle - the greenest and cleanest of animals, embodying the spirit of regeneration. Alive, she is a life-bringer, not only to her own offspring, but to all who can thrive on her gifts of milk, butter, cheese, yoghurt. With her intelligent grazing skills, she maintains a balance between pasture, soil, and all the life-forms which depend

upon them. She provides manure for the ground, warmth for the stable (and for the house too if you live in Tibet!) beauty for the eye - poetry for the soul. She teaches patience and when she dies, she gives her meat, her bones, her horns and hide as precious materials to be cherished and used. Every part of her finally goes back to replenish the earth from which she came. She can live locally, even in cities, (there were dairy cows in Hyde Park in 1910!) thus dispensing with food miles. Her raw milk contains lactase, the enzyme which helps to make dairy digestible, and which is destroyed during pasteurization. Can she really be the same creature as that global menace we are advised avoid? Which animal is real? In Celtic legend the fairy cow gave a pail of milk to all who needed it, until a witch came along and milked the cow into a sieve. This violation milked the cow dry, and thereafter there was no more milk and the people went hungry. It seems the question this beast asks us is: what do we want from life? If the answer is an unending MORE, the demands we make on our cattle will break them and break us too. A cow as industrial unit becomes a mere bio-lab for pathogens and pollution. Its intensively produced milk and meat will deliver little but indigestion. Its slurry is noxious. It consumes fossil fuel and produces greenhouse gas. It will destroy the planet. Before you know it, this cow has turned into a scapegoat. No longer inspiring love or awe, she fills us with alarm and fear. Yet, disturbing as she and her sisters are, the mad cow, the foot-and-mouth cow, the methane cow are only the first in a long line of other culprits. Behind them come chickens and poultry, migrating birds... Who is next? According to the current global narrative of doom, our fellow human beings may also be viewed as undesirable rivals, disease-bearers, resource-users. Surplus to requirement. Riven by suspicion and fear, all sense of belonging falls apart. Perhaps the world's surviving peasants and pastoralists, many of whom live cheek-by-jowl with genuine hunger can show us a better way. Before we dispense with the mirror of our hearts, is it worth seeing what would happen if we gave up on dread and instead cultivated the attitude of affection and trust towards life that was once our birth right? This would not make us invulnerable, but it just might restore a capacity for joy. We do not have to sour everything with dissatisfaction or milk plenty into a sieve. A crofter's life in the Western Isles was once fraught with peril.

For those caught between the storm and the wolf at home, and the marauding Dane across the sea, the one thing certain was hardship. And yet the Hebridean songs which survive from those 6th century days radiate a surprising warmth and hope and love of life. Every hearth and cradle and barn, even the milk churns and the threshing flails had their own protective blessings and incantations. Simply milking the cow was an act of devotion: "My speckled heifer will give me her milk,/And her female calf before her./ Ho my heifer! Heifer! Heifer!/ Ho my heifer! Kindly, calm,/ My heifer gentle, gentle, beloved,/ Thou art the love of thy mother."

Across the world in South Africa, the Xhosa people celebrate kinship with their cattle same way. A Xhosa chant goes: "To milk the cow is to praise the hand of God that moves before us/ To feed the cow is to worship the spirit that breathes within us/To kill the cow is to accept the darkness within us/ To spurn the cow is to spurn the gift of God that gives us life/ Milk the cow and feel the rhythm that beats inside us/ Touch the cow and feel the spirit that breathes within us/Kill the sorrow that lies before us..."

The Old English for cattle, 'kine', has links to the Old Teutonic word for 'brotherhood' and suggests a shared origin with the verbal root for 'kin'. For us, recovering kinship with all that sustains us might be a saving thing. In the Narrative of Doom, the Earth itself is demoted from loving mother to dysfunctional machine. How long before she too is deemed no longer fit for purpose? My hope is that before that happens, we will remember our family ties and heal the rifts. Singing to the earth – now that might be a start!
