to own the corner they live in. For them the violent upheavals of the 20th century, the apparently irreversible theft of time and individual sovereignty are beyond unimagining. Up on the Downs, they are still using oxen to plough and horses to harrow. In the rickyards they are still thatching haystacks and cornstacks with a confectioner's eye for beauty and perfection in every detail. There is an unspoken self-sufficiency, not merely practical, but inward – a learnt resolution, which I remember from my own great-aunts and -uncles of the same era, to take life's knocks on the chin. Also a determination to enjoy a holiday! Tea gardens, pleasure gardens abound. And skills abound. When it comes to building a float for the fair, or decorating the church for Harvest Festival, there are no half measures taken. Their school reading and writing might be shaky at best, but these folk are no fools. They know how to take the measure of their world. read the sky over their heads, and look out for their own. Of course, what is missing in this pictorial 'window' is the sound of voices blathering, and there would have been blathering and arguing and gossiping and cats caterwauling and dogs fighting and cocks crowing and horse dung everywhere, and fleas even and privies to empty... Most of that



has been tidied away, along with the seed cake and the lace doilies and the 'stink' of tobacco smoke. But to stand at this window and allow oneself to enter into it brings a sense of belonging which is worth recovering. I sometimes laugh that Michael spends more time in this 'lost' world than in our own present one, to which he retorts that I spend all my time lost in books. I am many centuries more out of date than him. But there is room for eccentrics in this all-embracing view of time, I am sure. We will go down as two hopeless ones! But perhaps we can retrieve things of value for others along the way.

HASSOCKS GOES GOLD – IT'S WORKING! Earlier this year, feeling tired, and very sad about Pearl, I was considering that this year would be the last Hassocks Goes Gold.... But then two things happened...

Firstly, I was contacted by Teddy's mother who, even though she is going through the very worst of times coping with Teddy's Neuroblastoma diagnosis and treatment was so considerate to think to warn me in case I was triggered by their fundraising. I am indeed, just as she predicted. But I am also galvanised by the injustice of so many families like Teddy's having to fundraise so much money for treatment abroad that should be offered and researched here.

The second call was from the Children's Cancer & Leukaemia Group, the charity supported by Hassocks Goes Gold. I am really delighted to tell you that we have enabled not one but two new research projects to go ahead! As per our mission statement in Pearl's name, both will fight aggressive types of childhood cancer with terribly poor outcomes.

The first project at the Institute of Child Health UCL, concentrates on Medulloblastoma - a common type of childhood brain tumour, attempting to create a new type of CAR-T immunotherapy treatment to improve survival rates currently as low as 5%.

The second project will be at the University of Oxford, researching the use of stem cells to treat Juvenile myelomonocytic leukaemia (JMML) an extremely rare leukaemia that is very aggressive. Currently only half of these children will survive for five years or more.

It is wonderful that the money raised in large part by this wonderful local community is having a real and direct impact on raising the level of vital research into Childhood Cancer.

So, I am happy to announce that Hassocks Goes Gold continues. The current amount raised for Pearl's fund has just passed the £87,000 mark so I'm setting my sights on smashing £100,000 by the end of September! Raising funds for research and raising awareness will help so many children in the future, and we'll have lots of fun along the way... there will be the glittering trail of sponsored Giant Gold Bows, Gold Tombolas at the village market, a Golden Dodgeball Tournament(!), the Sunflower growing competition (see separate article), the amazing Daily Auction and a Golden Gala finale on Friday **29th September**, and so, so much more... including very importantly the Golden

We thank Richard Mitchell for the following letter:-I am researching my grandparents Wilfred Emery and Dorothy Pearce, who were well known in Hassocks: both were Parish and District Councillors and chaired the Parish Council; he was a church warden and she was well known in Amateur Dramatics. Recently I have been trying to work out how my grandparents met and have established the following:

In 1911, the Emery family are in Wellington Villa, Lodge Road Keymer Hassocks, my grandfather having been born in Cowfold, his siblings in Keymer.

In various Electoral Rolls (ER) from 1918-1938 I find Wilfred's parents living at Maymead, Keymer. In the 1939 ER, the address is given as Maymead, Lodge Road.

In the 1939 Register, their address is MayMead, Lodge Lane.

The press report into Wilfred's father's funeral say he was of Parkmead Villa – that may be a mistake, unless Maymead and Parkmead were related somehow.

Dorothy's mother (and presumably she) were at No 1 Parkmead Villas in 1922, according to the ER,

(my grandmother was too young to be on it). The residents at No 2 Parkmead Villas then were living in Parkmead, Lodge Road in 1911, 9 doors

away from Wellington Villa, Lodge Road. This may be how my grandparents got to know each other.

This leads to various questions, and I wonder if you or someone who reads your magazine can help:

I wonder if Parkmead Villa was split into separate parts between 1911 and 1921?

Is there any information on Maymead, its location – and is it in anyway associate with Parkmead Villa?

Park Avenue is further down Lodge Lane, is that associated with Parkmead?

Where were Maymead, Parkmead, Wellington Villa, etc.

I have been looking at some old maps. Lodge Lane goes from Keymer south to Lodge Farm the other side of New Road which goes from Ditchling to near Clayton Tunnel. In some maps, the part of the road from the old Fire Station (at the end of Dale Avenue) northwards to the main road through Hassocks to Ditchling, the 'built up area' is labelled Lodge Road, though modern maps don't call any of it Lodge Road. It seems reasonable that addresses given as Lodge Road were on Lodge Lane. vou can help please email If me r.j.mitchell@reading.ac.uk.

The current hall committee recognise the need to continue to improve and we will have spent over  $\pounds 100,000$  in the past 12 months on the building, in-

In April, we applied for planning permission for 2 extensions and hopefully by the time you read this, permission will have been granted. We are going to extend the toilets, and we are going to extend the green room to create an alternative space to the main hall for around 60 people, with lovely views over the park and a new kitchen / servery.

This work, however is at least a year away from happening - we are hopeful of grants to fund half of the work, but with a price tag of around £500,000 we will be, once more, looking to the village to support our efforts. We have more exciting activities planned for the summer term including Mid-Sussex Athletics, a geography trip for year 3 to learn about land use and how maps show you where things are, a trip to Butser Ancient Farm for year 4 to help learn more about life in ancient Britain, and a trip to Brighton for year 5, where they will visit the Royal Pavilion and learn about the Georgian era.

Flowers 16: primrose, bluebell, lesser celandine,

**STAG BEETLE** I've only ever had one sporting hero. In the red corner, standing 6ft 6 and weighing in at 365lbs, Big Daddy kept my Gran and me glued to the TV set on wet Saturday afternoons as he wrestled Giant Haystacks or Kendo Nagasaki in his sequinned spandex. In June, Stag Beetles – the big daddies of the beetle world - are emerging from the ground and getting ready to rumble. There's around 3,000 different species of beetle in Sussex and an estimated 29,000 species across Europe. Just as Big Daddy's 64-inch chest earned him a place in the Guinness Book of Records, the 2.5 inch long Stag Beetle holds the coveted title of Europe's Biggest Beetle. And, like a 26 stone man in a spangly leotard, the adult male Stag Beetle is equally impressive and ludicrous. Its 3-segmented black and maroon armoured body is crowned with a ridiculous pair of trademark staglike 'antlers'. They are actually modified mandible mouthparts and are used to impress the antler-less females and to grapple rival males.

Before these tiny titans step into the ring they have to put in some long hours in training. The beetle's larvae spend an incredible 5-6 years munching on a deadwood diet of buried logs and roots, building the bulky body that will sustain them to survive above ground. As adults they will live for just a few weeks without feeding, relying solely on the fuel tanks accumulated underground. In early summer, after pupation and transformation, they burst from the ground and go looking for a fight. I always find it incredible that these chunky, bulky beetles can fly but on warm evenings they whir through the air with the grace and subtlety of a Chinook on aerial reconnaissance for females. But if another male beats them to it that's when things get nasty.

In my fantasies I imagine these beetle brawls to play out on a dead tree stump. A crowd of over-excited elderly invertebrates gather round; the grasshoppers and crickets chirping in with a chorus of "We shall not be moved" while the earthworms and earwigs chant "Eas-eh! Easeh!" The fighters face off before charging and locking antlers. With incredible strength a Stag Beetle can lift his opponent into the air, holding him there heroically before spectacularly body-slamming them down onto the stump.

We're fortunate that southeast England is a hotspot for these Herculean heavyweights but sadly our Stag Beetles are on the ropes. The loss of old trees from the countryside has had dramatic impacts on the survival of the beetles' underground larvae and their numbers are declining. My tip for spotting a Stag Beetle is to look for them in June in Henfield churchyard in West Sussex or around Ringmer in East Sussex.

**FREE TALK ON SWIFTS** Wednesday 14th June 7 pm. Around here, the call of swifts as they scythe through the sky in twos and fours has been one of the iconic sounds of the summer. Every year these migratory birds arrive at the beginning of May from Africa and return there in August after nesting. Until a few summers ago, like many other villages, Hurstpierpoint had several thriving swift populations.

These are astonishing birds, they are the fastest in level flight, beating the peregrine falcon and the quickest hummingbird to reach motorway-style speeds of 69 mph, clocking up literally millions of miles in a lifetime. They can stay entirely airborne for 10 months, eating, sleeping and breeding as they surf the air currents, and they live for up to 21 years, partnering for life, and returning to the same nesting sites every year. Swifts found themselves on the red list of endangered animals two years ago, and their species is currently in free fall. The ravages of climate change coupled with the fact that farmland offers very little sustenance to wild creatures has led to a precipitous decline in insect life, and swifts feed exclusively on flying insects. There is also a lack of suitable nesting sites. For millennia swifts nested in tall pines but adapted to roosting in the eaves of old houses and other high buildings. Renovations and plastic fittings mean space for these birds has dwindled to a critical point.

This year Hurst Rethink are actively promoting these birds' welfare in response to the dramatic drop in numbers locally. In March, ten audio nesting boxes were installed in Weald Close, where there used to be a healthy population. Hurst Rethink are monitoring the use of these boxes closely in this first year,

Everyone is invited to a free talk about swifts and other local wildlife, held at 7 pm in the back room of The New Inn on Wednesday **14th June**. Renowned swift expert Edward Mayer will give a talk, and experts will promote the cause of Sussex bats, pond life and hedgehogs. There will also be a plant stall and the chance to buy a drink. Please come and support us; by better understanding our local wildlife, we can better support it.

When an uncommonly long drought threatens to up-end everything they know, Virginio and Sisa must decide on the future shape of their lives. Their dilemma is precipitated by the arrival of their grandson Clever, who comes to visit with news. The three of them must face, each in their own way, the effects of a dramatically changing environment and the threats it poses to tradition.

Clever wants his grandparents to move to the city with the rest of the family. What he fails to understand is that the question for Virginio and Sisa is not where to live, but where to die. And when they are gone, who will be left in the family to speak the indigenous Quechua language or live their way of life.

This visually jaw-dropping debut feature is directed by Bolivian photographer-turned-filmmaker,Alejandro Loayza Gris, with award-winning cinematography by Barbara Alvarez. MEN'S HEALTH WEEK 13th - 19th June. International Men's Health Week (IMHW) is an international week celebrated in several countries the week preceding and including Father's Day to focus on issues facing men's health. The week is an opportunity to highlight the importance of men's health and promote their physical, mental, and emotional wellbeing. The goal of International Men's Health Week is to increase awareness of male health issues on a global level and encourage institutions to develop health policies and services that meet the specific needs of men, boys, and their families. It is important to be conscious of serious health conditions, so, for this year's Men's Health Week, which runs 13th – 19th June it's time for men everywhere, to give themselves an MOT - whether it's your mental or physical wellbeing, men across the UK and Internationally are being asked to check-in with their bodies and minds. We ask Barnaby Chappell, Consultant Urologist, what things we can do in terms of our urological health, to just check everything is as it should be?

"I can understand why men shy away from issues with their urinary tract, erectile dysfunction or prostate but, like most illness or disease, we need to know more about these problems, and although the more we search for them, the more cases we find, it does help us get closer to helping people live longer with something like prostate cancer. With the PSA test, available through your GP, for example, we can identify who might be at





risk of prostate cancer and monitor them accordingly. The earlier we spot symptoms, the greater the chance of finding curative solutions for them."

The consultant added that symptoms don't always mean bad news and that if men visit their doctor early on, they might save themselves a whole lot of worry. "Many of the signs that people associate with the prostate can be harmless. For example, problem urinating can be caused by the enlarging of the prostate gland, but that does not necessarily mean cancer. Also, erectile dysfunction can actually have more to do with the heart and can precede heart conditions that may present themselves in a few years' time. So it's definitely worthwhile being examined to manage, prevent or treat that."

"Finally, I would urge men to check their testicles regularly. It is usually possible to cure testicular cancer. But it is easier to treat when it is diagnosed early. Doing this regularly means you will soon get to know what feels normal for you. A normal testicle should feel smooth and firm, but not hard. It can be easier to check the testicles during, or right after, a warm bath or shower when the scrotal skin is relaxed. Hold the scrotum in the palm of your hand. Use your fingers and thumb to examine each testicle. You should feel for any lumps or swelling, any differences between the testicles. It is normal for the testicles to be slightly different in size or for one to hang lower than the other."
