body goes about the business of rebuilding its defences. It feels strangely like Christmas already - that weightless feeling you get after Christmas lunch when the washing-up is done, the presents are unwrapped and the frantic effort of trying to be in six places at once is temporarily stalled. And as I succumb to it, I realise that this time-out is a special gift. We are in limbo, which is what Christmas, and the pre-Christian days of the Winter Solstice were always considered to be. During this period, there is a pause. The Earth resets itself, aligning anew with the forces of regeneration and renewal which will later become visible in the green shoots of spring. Pagan solstice celebrations and the Roman Festival of Saturnalia all took place during this period of time 'suspended', and the Twelve Days of Christmas tucked themselves comfortably into the same space. For the duration of the Feast, normal conventions were turned on their heads. Work stopped and a spirit of anarchy prevailed. In the Middle Ages, it was the custom to appoint boys as bishops, who for

a few days, held sway over their ecclesiastical elders; masters and servants swapped places; jesting and conning, quizzing and fooling became the order of the day under a Lord of Misrule. (We still wear the crowns and pose the riddles when we pull our Christmas crackers, today). The daily dictates of self-gratification gave place to sharing and giving. Somewhere under all the tinsel and techno-gadgetry of our modern times, lies the ghost of Old Christmas, the strange, unsettling feeling of a world vaster and more complex than we can imagine, turning over like a sleeper and showing us an unfamiliar face. And here is the magic of it all. The face we see is our own face - which has been all along silently attuned to values we may scarcely recognise in our everyday lives. We are made so uncomfortable by these values we call them childish and then say 'Christmas is really only for children' and all the while, we secretly long to be to be a Christmas child and believe in magic again. Somewhere

under the heaps of baubles and solar lights is a yearning for connection to something *other*, yet intrinsically our own: the life-sap of our planet home.

At Christmas the greenwood comes indoors. It may be only a plastic spray of holly, or a picture on a Christmas card, but the liminal, otherworldly mystery of the season is nowhere stronger than in this threshold-crossing. Bringing in the ivy and holly, the Yule-log, the fir boughs, goes way back beyond the time of the Druids. Early clerics tried to ban pagan greenery in churches, but they could not get the people to give up their attachment to it. Even under the Puritans it was common to bring mistletoe into church and the poorest cottage would have its jug of holly. Evergreens were the mainstay of the vegetal world-spirit in our cold Northern hemisphere. All powerful healing plants in their own way, the bay and rosemary, ivy, juniper and holly, celebrated in Christmas carols and poems, brought the vibrant aromatics of their health-giving terpenes and volatile hydrocarbons into every Christmas home. In the early days at Stoneywish, we would make a natural Father Christmas grotto for our Christmas customers. Michael would cut great swathes of evergreens till the stable-space was dark and pungent and filled with palpable plant magic. It was strange and a little bit scary but it opened the heart in an inexplicable way!

This same viriditas, energy of the greenwood, traditionally brought people health and hope through the darkest days of the year. In pagan times the greenery would stay up until 31st January, when new life and the returning light of the sun could be celebrated in a new festival. Candlemas on 2nd February is the Christian Festival of Light and by then snowdrops could come indoors to replace the redundant holly. Now all greenery is taken down by Twelfth Night. After that, normality returns. The ox goes back to his yoke, the peasant to his plough, the merchant to his trade and the rest of us to a Health Farm for slimming and de-toxing and whatever the current gurus prescribe!

But when the Christmas tree has been sent to the recycling, and the baubles are back in the attic, wouldn't it be wonderful to keep a sprig of that greenwood magic in our hearts? To remember stillness? Not having an agenda? So that when we step out of our homes, we come as healthgivers, life-givers, to the green world which lies beyond.

# NEWS UPDATE FROM AIR AMBULANCE CHARITY KENT SURREY SUSSEX

It's been a busy few month for Air Ambulance Charity Kent Surrey Sussex (KSS).

We're here for millions of people across Kent, Surrey and Sussex. Every day we respond to nine emergency calls on average – giving people the best chance of survival and keeping families together.

In July we remembered the dedication and devotion of our crew members Graham Budden, Mark Darby and Tony Richardson, three incredible men who sadly lost their lives in a helicopter accident whilst serving with the charity, 25 years ago.

In a private remembrance ceremony held in July, family members, Team KSS colleagues, volun-

teers, and representatives from other emergency services, gathered at the memorial stone at Blue Bell Hill in honour of Graham, Mark and Tony. This was followed by a Memorial Service at The Collegiate Church of All Saints, Maidstone.

Later in the day, a memorial bench dedicated to Graham, Mark and Tony to mark the 25th anniversary was unveiled at our Rochester base. Memorial plaques dedicated to the three crew members were also unveiled at both our Rochester and Redhill bases.

In August a record number of 155 horses and riders saddled up for this year's KSS Ride, raising £8K to support our work.

Participants enjoyed beautiful blue skies and a scenic eight-mile ride through the scenic Bilsington Priory Estate near Ashford.

During September and October, we held a series of four Heli Hikes across Kent, Surrey and Sussex. We welcomed over 700 of our amazing supporters to these events, which raised an incredible total of £50K to help us continue our lifesaving work.

In September we celebrated Air Ambulance Week by hosting an Emergency Services Family Fun Day at Rochester Airport, and marked ten years of becoming the first Air Ambulance charity in the country to fly 24/7, 365 days a year, enabling us to reach more patients and save more lives.

On 29 September 2013 KSS became the first Air Ambulance in the country to provide a 24/7 helicopter service all year round when a team flew to a patient involved in a road traffic collision near Canterbury, treated them and accompanied

them to hospital.

Since then, we have treated more than 2,000 patients at night and our aircraft have flown approximately a quarter of a million miles at night, equivalent to flying around the Earth 11 times or travelling to the Moon.

In October around 17K children and adults,

from across the South East were equipped with the confidence and skills to provide life-saving CPR to mark national Restart a Heart Day.

On Monday 16 October, we provided free livestreamed interactive awareness sessions on what to do in an emergency and how to provide CPR to someone in cardiac arrest.

The sessions were live-streamed across platforms, including YouTube, Facebook, Teams and Twitter.

Air Ambulance Charity Kent Surrey Sussex fights to save lives every single day and Christmas is no exception.

Last December we were called to 72 road traffic collisions, 96 medical emergencies and 60 acci





dental injuries. Traffic accidents along with injuries from falls, cuts and burns are higher in December than at any other time of year. When the unexpected does happen, getting our special

ist critical care teams to you quickly can make all the difference.

We're proud to be a charity that provides life-saving care over the festive season. Your help is vital in helping us reach those in need faster. Together we can give families a chance to share another Christmas together.

Your support keeps us in the air 24/7, 365 days a year so we can keep families together when it really matters.

Throughout the year, KSS organises a number of different fundraising events and, this summer, there are lots of opportunities to take part and help the life-saving charity raise vital funds.

Jane Leng I GOT YOU UNDER MY SKIN I like to think that most of us are good neighbours to the wild animals we share this planet with. We feed the birds, grow flowers in the garden for bees and butterflies. But if wildlife gets too close or, heaven forbid, enters our houses we're reaching for the fly spray or a rolled-up newspaper. I get plenty of hear that the adults live for just five days and then people complaining to me about home-invading wildlife as if I'm some sort of envoy for the animal kingdom. Yet while they moan about clothes moths in their wardrobe, I just stand there smiling, reassured by the knowledge that these people have wildlife living right under their noses. Well, to be more precise, right in their noses.

OK, I warn you now: after reading this article some of you will be scouring your face with a Brillo pad. But it's time to face the facts. Your face is crawling with animals. You, yes you, have face mites. And there's no 'might' about it - research has shown that 100% of adults have them. Our faces are one big nature reserve for mites: from your mountainous nose and skin pore caves to your eyelash jungles. In fact, our faces are home to two different species. Demodex folliculorum thrive in your eyelashes while Demodex brevis lurk in your pores. They're feeding on dead skin cells and oils but don't harm us – a commensal parasite.

Before you run to the bathroom mirror, these guys are tiny. I'm not going to lie to you, they're not pretty (unless you think a microscopic 8-legged slug is pretty) and under high-powered microscopes they look like something you'd encounter in a galaxy far, far away. The egg and larval stages last two weeks and you'll probably be relieved to



die. And it's right about here you'll realise that these things are constantly mating on your face. You can scrub and scrub, but you can't wash away the hard truth: you're just a mammal. And like dogs, cows, orangutans and meerkats we're the perfect hosts for a range of parasites.

Personally, I've grown quite fond of my little pets - despite never being able to see them. When I go to bed at night, I imagine Clarence the Demodex, climbing from his pore, going for a wander across my cheek and hoping to meet a girlfriend. But instead, he meets his nemesis Evil Arthur and a mite fight ensues until ...well, you get the idea. There are hundreds of these little adventures happening on your face every night. Sweet dreams.

#### **FOSSIL HUNT BY CHILDREN AT VILLAGE SCHOOL AS THEY CREATE A NEW GARDEN** A mid Sussex village school is poised to create a garden for its pupils.

Albourne Church of England primary school's Year Six students have been given much of the equipment they need in a donation from Sussex-based charity The Budding Foundation. It works to support children and young families in need across the county.
