

**PUBLICITY OPPORTUNITIES AT OLDLAND WINDMILL** 2018 was another very successful year for Oldland Mill. Despite the major task of refurbishing two sweeps during the summer of 2018 and the interruption this caused in the regular milling activities, a lot of milling was carried out in advance of the refurbishment to build up a stock of flour for sale. This enabled us to maintain the supply to our regular outlets. After rehanging the sweeps, we again focussed on milling to replenish our stock of flour in the Autumn so as not to disappoint all our many customers.

As we always anticipated, running a working windmill is very different to restoring a windmill, but we have created a milling team of volunteers who enjoy the excitement - and challenge – of controlling the windmill. There is very great satisfaction in standing inside the windmill as she grinds away, swaying slightly to the rhythmic rotation of the wind shaft as fine white flour pulses out from the spout. But to ensure that the mill runs reliably and safely we need to attract a steady income to cover

the regular maintenance and insurance costs.

Our Promotion and Fund-raising Team look after all aspects of publicity including designing and printing the A4 posters on display in the village before open days, designing and printing various mill leaflets and cards of all descriptions for sale in aid of mill funds, and ensuring that notice of our events appear in the local press. The team also explore opportunities to sell more flour and raise funds by other means. The team meets every two to three months and the meetings (which are informal and good fun!) rarely last more than one and a half hours. We have recently lost a couple of regular team members and are looking for replacements. We're particularly interested in attracting some more volunteers who are so-cial media savvy and interested in working with our Web Master to ensure that our website remains current.

**HASSOCKS PARISH COUNCIL** In May 2019 there will be local elections for the Parish and District Councils. The Parish Council which works solely for the local community consists of 15 councillors and these posts are all up for re-election. This is a really good opportunity for local residents to take on a role that helps to meet the needs of our community. To give you a flavour of what's involved I have written the following piece:

What the Parish Council does - Well there is the practical stuff like the Parish Office where you can get lots of local info including for example Bus Timetables, Planning Applications, info on local organisations as well as lots of other help if you don't know who to approach. Then there's running and maintaining Adastra Park and Memorial Garden both of which were gifted to the community by Edward Stafford; whilst it's quite unusual for a Parish to have a park (most are run by Mid Sussex Council) it does allow us to update it with facilities that local people use and currently there is a major project to improve the range of facilities over the next two years. We also own and manage two pieces of land - Parklands Copse where the access was improved a few years ago with a new footpath giving an attractive streamside walk which emerges into fields with lovely views of the South Downs and Talbot Field (on the road towards Hurst) which is kept as a managed wild area to support local wildlife and offer a spot for a quite wander or possibly even a family picnic. Oh yes and there's the Burial

Ground at Keymer. We also do lots of other things that involve working with either Mid Sussex District or West Sussex County Councils. Sometimes we can only encourage them to take action that benefits the local community - But by providing some modest additional funding from the Parish we have been most effective in getting West Sussex to properly implement the Hassocks Traffic and Parking Scheme and also to improve a couple of local Footpaths and Bridleways - all against pressures to spend their budgets on other communities. Currently we are working on a revised Neighbourhood Plan with Mid Sussex with the aim of protecting the character of the Village which is a tough call given that the National Government has set housing targets for the District Council and that the Railway Station and Schools are seen by both Builders and Planners as a reason to focus on Hassocks. The Parish Council meets once a month to oversee the running of the council and there are a number of Committees that manage the facilities and projects that are underway. Meetings are normally held in the evening and the commitment can be as little as a couple of evenings per month although as they find projects that inspire them it's not unusual for individual councillors to increase their commitment from time to time.

**ADASTRA PARK PROJECT UPDATE DECEM BER 2018** Since the consultation event in May, much work has been going on behind the scenes to progress improvements to the park using the Park Masterplan as our guide.

Garden of Remembrance - Improvements to the Garden of Remembrance had the greatest support from the consultation responses. During the consultation we asked for volunteers to work on the Garden, and as a result we are fortunate to have acquired a keen pool of dedicated people who have worked hard tidying borders, pruning trees and cutting hedges to prepare the area for the next stage of the work, which will involve planting borders and improving the pathways.

Rain Garden - As many of you may have noticed, the rain garden has now been installed in the South Field, Adastra Park. The garden is an initiative of HKD Transition and has been installed in partnership with the Parish Council. It is designed to help mitigate the effects of heavy rainfall on the drainage system, and, once es-



tablished, the garden will also provide some natural play value and be a feature within the park. A local company, Garden Sage, has kindly designed the planting scheme and provided plants for the rain garden, which HKD will maintain.

Both of the above projects have been excellent opportunities for partnership working with the community.

Wheel/Skatepark - We have appointed a project manager to oversee the development of this initiative, and the tender has now been advertised. It is anticipated that a preferred supplier(s) will have been selected in the New Year, and a public consultation will be held inviting those interested to view and comment on the proposed design(s). These responses will be valuable in helping to shape the final design.

**MESSAGE FROM SUSSEX POLICE AND CRIME COMMISSIONER, KATY BOURNE - SUSSEX PO-LICE FUNDING 2018-2022** Sussex Police have started the biggest intake of new police officers for over a decade. This has been made possible by the increase in police precept of an average £12 for a band D property, and the PCC releasing £17 million from reserves. It means that over the next four years, Sussex will have 200 more police officers on the frontline than it does today.

Although residents are pleased to hear that local policing will be strengthened by these 200 extra officers, they are already indicating that they would like even more. That is why the PCC has opened a survey on her website to gauge potential support for raising more funding locally if the Government lifts the current cap on the police precept.

Set in Russia, the film is about an estranged couple going through a brutal and hostile divorce. Loveless uses a toxic marriage to paint a larger portrait of decay, dereliction and moral detachment.

#### DAISY: GROWING UP IN A SUSSEX VILLAGE 1897 – 1919 – AN AUTOBIOGRAPHY BY EVA DAISY ELLIS (NEE RANDELL), EDITED BY PETER BERRESFORD ELLIS AND PUBLISHED BY THE HURST HISTORY STUDY GROUP IN 2003. Extract, Page 183 to 186

But it was now the turn of the village to become a central part of the history of the war. Hurst was to become a "centre" of the war's direction, at least from the British viewpoint, during that last year of 1918.

How it came about, I do not really know, perhaps it has already been recorded in some history book or in some memoir. So far as the people of Hurst knew Lord Riddell, the owner of The News of the World and a close personal friend of the Prime Minister, David Lloyd George, had arranged to rent Danny Mansion from the Campions. What no one knew initially was that Lord Riddell had rented it on behalf of Lloyd George as a country "retreat". Why this was is, perhaps, something of a mystery. I have never seen any explanation.

Only a few months before (October 5, 1917) Sir Arthur Lee had given a house and estate near Great Missenden, 35 miles from London, called "Chequers", to the nation in perpetuity for the use of the incumbent Prime Minister as a country residence. Why then had Lloyd George decided to rent Danny Mansion in Hurstpierpoint? Was the refurbishment at "Chequers" incomplete or was it for se-

curity measures? I think it probably was [the latter] for there was absolutely no mention of the fact even in the local newspaper and I know that Harry Beal, who used to be the local reporter, cycling into Hurstpierpoint every week on his bicycle from Burgess Hill to pick up the news, actually knew that Danny had an "eminent personality" staying there.

At no time was there any mention of Lloyd George's presence there, save once. I heard afterwards that the one "slip" created a furore. In a report of the village whist drive to raise funds for a war charity, Lloyd George's name was listed. The local newspaper was, I am told, "hauled over the coals" about this. So I would say that the "authorities" did not want it generally known that Lloyd George was in residence at Danny. The Campions, so far as I recall, had moved to a house on the estate, and it had been put about that Danny Mansion was "empty". That was a story repeated in the local newspaper with George Beal adding, slyly, that he had, however, noticed some "eminent persons" on the lawns of the house.

Anyway, Danny Mansion and the village were chosen to be Prime Minister David Lloyd George's country home from July until November, 1918.

My father was "over the moon". In the heart of the Conservative controlled county, he was one of the stalwarts of the local Liberal Party. Indeed, the Randell family was, as I have explained before, very much Liberals of





the late Victorian tradition, pledged to radical social and electoral reform and "Home Rule" for Ireland, Scotland and Wales. Cousin David Randell, who had been Liberal Member of Parliament for Gower, had been one of our family icons.

Well, Lloyd George was my father's political idol. In July, 1917, Lloyd George had stayed for a few weeks at Great Walstead, about a mile-and-a-half from Lindfield, which was not far away from Hurst. My father was one of the leading Mid-Sussex Liberals who had been invited up to some garden party held at the house and had met his "hero". Therefore, when Lloyd George arrived in Hurst in July, 1918, and gave a private reception to the party faithful, which was given at Danny, my father received his invitation and off he went in his best suit to meet Lloyd George. I remember how happy he was when he came back. He said that the Prime Minister had remembered him from the previous year. Perhaps Lloyd George's aide had given him a good brief on village Liberal supporters. Father said that he had been able to have a long talk with him.

Well, soon after came another invitation for him to attend a grand party at Danny. This was during the first week in August and this time the invitation included my mother and "family". Well, at the time, there was only me at home. However, it was too good an opportunity to pass by and even Elsie decided to come up from

Brighton to join us. The invitation plunged both Elsie and I into a fever. We would have to have new dresses. We had absolutely nothing to wear! I can remember how we dashed around in a panic seeking something suitable. Eventually we had our new dresses. Elsie's was pink and mine was blue. We had large "Dolly Varden" hats with ribbons hanging down the back and small bunches of forget-me-nots, lace gloves and parasols and "dolly bags" for our handkerchiefs. We spend hours sewing the accessories to make sure they were perfect. It is strange but I cannot remember what my mother wore though I can recall father in his grey flannel suit, white shirt and grey cravat, with pin, and his top silk hat.

There was a band playing on the lawn outside Danny, the Sussex Yeomanry Cadet Band from Brighton. There were large marquees, an area for dancing, refreshment tents and countless people, many in uniforms of all colours and sizes. The noise of voices and laughter often drowned out the band. I recall Mrs Arthur Weekes fussing around the stalls and Mrs Anscombe running refreshments.

Reverend Finch was apparently in charge of the fete, and there was a sale of work to help the wounded soldiers, many of whom were allowed to attend. Colonel and the Hon. Mrs Campion were there, waiting attendance on the Prime Minister.

**SHORT-EARED OWL** - They came from the land of ice and snow. On soft, silent wings they came. Gliding over forests and skimming across the lowlands until the seemingly impassable dark sea stretched out ahead of them. But still they flew on.

The first signs of this Nordic invasion came in October. Observers stationed on the Norfolk coastline watched the first of them glide overhead. Another followed. Then another. Elsewhere along our eastern seaboard, more silent invaders were arriving.

Short-eared owls are scarce winter visitors to Sussex. Swiss ornithologist Paul Geroudet described them as 'nomads who camp where the table is laid'. This winter dozens of these wandering diners were reported in Sussex and small parliaments (the collective term for owls, pub quizzers) lingered around the meadows along the county's river valleys where they have tucked in to a bountiful rodent buffet.

In Sussex we have four breeding owl species. The most familiar will be the tawny owl – whose hoots and twitto-woos can be heard in our woodlands. The barn owl is that pale spectral spirit that may be glimpsed in the headlights along country lanes at night. The long-eared owl is our rarest, most elusive species. The little owl was introduced here in the 19th century. It eats worms. So when short-eared owls arrive it's an extra owl to get ex-

cited about. The meadows around the Ouse, Arun and Adur become popular destinations for owl watchers to observe these graceful daytime hunters.

And a hunting short-eared owl is a sight to behold. It's a large bird - with a one metre wingspan - but agile. It twists, weaves and glides low over the ground before dropping hard on its prey. Its 'short ears' are just feather tufts. Its bright yellow eyes are set in a face which seems fixed in a permanent impatient, angry expression.

I recently led a walk to see these owls and our group waited patiently on the Ouse banks. Our first sighting was high, distant and disappointing. But another hunting owl, seemingly oblivious to us, flew closer. And closer... and closer still. There is something eerie about the sound of seventeen people not breathing, but as the owl passed by we were stunned and as silent as its wingbeats. After hunting, the owls will gather and roost, no doubt dreaming of Northern Lights, lemmings and the long journey home.
