





MAKE A CHANGE, BECOME A LOCAL COUNCIL-LOR Hassocks Parish Council is calling on residents passionate about their community to stand in the local elections in May 2019.

What do Councillors do? Councillors are champions of their community and give residents a voice on the decisions the council makes. Becoming a councillor will allow you to make a real difference in your community by engaging with residents, local groups and businesses to find out their needs; making decisions on which services and projects the council should take forward; and getting involved locally to ensure the services are meeting your community's needs. How long does it take? The National Association of Local Councils (NALC) Local Councillor Census survey found that councillors put aside, on average, three hours a week for council work. This often includes attending meetings, engaging with residents and speaking on behalf of the council to other bodies.

Can I stand? There are only a few rules to stand for election. You must be: A British citizen, or a citizen of the Commonwealth, or the European Union, 18 years of age or older, Live in an area that is served by Hassocks Parish Council. If you are interested in standing you will need to submit your nomination papers no later than the **3rd April**.



NEWS FROM STONEYWISH These days after Christmas sometimes seem the darkest, though the daylight is in fact lengthening, little by little. The old country saying goes 'February, black or white' and in parts of the country the snow has come already, while we here have the pleasure of black branches, black ditches and a north wind under the door. All the same, spring changes are afoot. The snowdrops are out. The birds are testing snatches of true song amidst their winter twitter. An optimistic woodpecker drums out across the paddock. And the sap must be rising. Michael sets out before first light to feed the animals and break the ice on the water troughs. The pigs grunt excitedly at the first squeak of his wheelbarrow, which tells them breakfast is coming. The sheep wait in silence. But they have been busy overnight, grazing by moonlight on the nutritious buds which are swelling in the hedgerows. Every day some sheep fail to appear for roll-call and Michael has to scour the field edges, looking for those that have foraged so deep, they have got themselves tangled up. Looking for black sheep in the dark is a challenge for any Bo Peep! But eventually they are all free and accounted for. With a nibble of barley, they go to sit and enjoy their cud. Then straight back to foraging again – the taste of spring is irresistible.

One note on sheep and cud and global warming, in the light of recent media debate. Perhaps, before we blame innocent animals for our own meddling in the earth's cli-





mate, we should distinguish between traditional and intensive farming practices. Animals on pasture perform the miraculous feat of turning cellulose, i.e. grass into complex and vital animal proteins. They also husband the land, returning vegetable growth to the soil in their faeces, in a form perfectly designed to support future healthy growth, i.e. plants with their full compliment of minerals and vitamins. This process, requiring no chemical inputs, no animal feed factories, or transport networks, supports the extraordinary biodiversity associated with natural pastures, from wild flowers to butterflies and bees, birds and larger wildlife species. Since grass itself captures significant amounts of greenhouse gases, the methane produced by traditional, pasture fed animals will be reabsorbed in a cycle of a decade or so. According to a report by the Royal Agricultural University some 60% of the world's farms are still small-scale subsistence farms, producing 40% of the world's food supply powered by sunlight. Perhaps climate experts should take another look at this vast body of sustainable land-use before abandoning ancient wisdom and throwing the baby out with the bath-water?

Michael and Mike keep warm these bitter days, in a last dash to finish fencing and mending and restoring paths before the Reserve reopens on **1st March**. There is a new tunnel to explore in the Play Area and there will be a new exhibition of pictures from the Stoneywish Archive at the Visitor Centre, this time featuring vintage shots of



WINDMILL PAINTING TIME APPROACHES! Have you ever painted a real windmill? Now is your chance!

For newcomers to the village, Oldland Windmill is one of the oldest regularly working windmills in the country being built around 1700. We now produce stone ground flour which may be purchased on site or through our growing number of retail outlets including local garden centres, farm shops and the Ditchling Museum. Thursdays remain our regular volunteers working day throughout the year but we've now returned to our previous practice of adding Tuesdays as well due to popular demand! Do call in if you're taking a stroll past the mill. The sweeps (the Sussex term for sails) are taken down for a thorough refurbishment every seven years. Two were refurbished last year and the remaining pair will be addressed this year. As in previous years we invite our members, friends and neighbours to help with the repainting; you'll be surprised what a large area there is to paint when you see the sweeps close up on the ground! HEDGEHOGS' UNIQUE APPEARANCE AND PROX-IMITY IN GARDENS AND SUBURBAN GREEN SPACES PLACE THEM FIRMLY IN THE PUBLIC'S <u>AFFECTIONS</u>. They're a wild mammal we can observe

close-up and are a beloved symbol of our natural heritage. In a local push to encourage locals to look out for these animals, Ann Winney from local hedgehog rescue Hurst Hedgehog Haven will be at in Hassocks next month.

The area's new 'Hedgehog Hero' will be visiting South Downs Nurseries from 10 am to 4 pm on Sunday **24th March**, giving advice on what we can do to help hedgehogs and improve their numbers in our local area.

The Hedgehog Heroes initiative is run by the British Hedgehog Preservation Society, and encourages businesses to remind visitors of the importance of looking out for Hedgehogs in the area. This includes checking areas of the garden before using any gardening equipment such as strimmers and mowers.

In 2007, hedgehogs were made a priority conservation species in Britain under the then UK Biodiversity Action Plan (BAP). In 2015, The State of Britain's Hedgehogs, by People's Trust for Endangered Species (PTES) and the British Hedgehog Preservation Society (BHPS), outlined the findings of four surveys recording hedgehogs in urban and rural areas, and showed a worrying decline in hedgehog numbers. Hedgehogs continue to face pressures in the rural landscape and from urban development, but monitoring numbers, and initiatives such as 'Hedgehog Street' and 'Hedgehog Heroes', plus public efforts to improve garden habitats and connectivity, might just give them a fighting

DITCHLING DOWNS WI Our speaker for the January meeting, was Dai Thomas telling us about the work of the charity Sussex Search and Rescue, which is a primary resource for Sussex Police. They are a team of professionally trained and equipped volunteers all of whom are able to employ highly specialist skills in the search for vulnerable missing people. Within an hour of being called out they can assemble a dedicated team of searchers on the ground anywhere in Sussex. The search team have advanced observational skills, and work in teams of four. The charity was developed in response to the disappearance and murder of 8 year old Sarah Payne in 2000. Sarah went missing in early July that year, but her body wasn't found for over 2 weeks, and it was 15 miles from where she had been last seen. The volunteers, who are self-funded, provide a vital resource to the police. There is no government funding, so fund raising is a high priority for the charity. The website is:
