POLICE REPORT Over a number of months this year, Hassocks along with many other towns and villages up and down the country have experienced varying levels of anti-sociable behaviour, predominately and unfortunately by just a few younger individuals that give others in the same age group a bad name. The majority of our younger people are law abiding and upstanding citizens. Anti-social behaviour in its own rights is not a crime however some of the acts that make up anti-social behaviour are. This can include anything from groups of individuals 'hanging' around the streets and parks, being abusive to passing law abiding members of the public, assaults, littering and breaking bottles in public areas like skate parks, smoking drugs, shoplifting etc. The list is endless. A short while ago I met with some individuals from the village to discuss what can be done locally to try an prevent issues in the future. As soon as I have further information on any future ideas, I will let you know. It has been said that people do not see the Police as often as they would like. Without going into the politics and staffing of local Policing, it was decided locally that we would ensure, where resources allow, to patrol as much as we could in the Hassocks area. This I can assure you,



hassocksinteriors@gmail.com has been done. Just because you maybe did not see anyone does not mean that we were not there.

I have recently spoken to one of our Speed Watch co-ordinators and I am arranging to support them on a regular basis where we can. This is twofold in that we will be visible and we will be enforcing speeders in the village. Being visible does prevent other issues as well as this.

As with all emergency services at the moment, we can be very stretched. What is a fact though is that the Police do not deal with everything and that the responsibility for many things that happen in any town or village lie with other agencies and partners. Parents of course also have a duty to ensure that they are aware of where their children are, who they are with and what they are getting up to. The Police are NOT child minders.

I am also arranging for myself and two of my PCSO's to be at the Adastra Park car park on Sunday **20th Octo-ber** from 2 pm to 4 pm should anyone wish to come and chat and say hello and to discuss any issues that you may have. The personal approach quite often works better.

Finally I would ask that people don't report matters to social media platforms which in most cases put things out of context from what they really are. If you want to report a non-urgent matter to Police then call 101 or go to our website at **www.sussex.police.uk**.

THANK YOU EVERYONE! HASSOCKS TRULY WENT GOLD FOR CHILDHOOD CANCER AWARENESS LAST MONTH!

I had a vision of what I wanted to achieve with gold window displays and raising awareness, but our village community has again blown me away with enthusiasm, creativeness and caring. It would take the entire magazine to thank everyone who got involved, helped out and held events... but if I may, just one massive thank you to Kelly Foley from Mid-Sussex Carpets & Flooring Ltd, who believed in me from the start, supported, helped out and sponsored all the printing of letters, flyers and shop posters.

I'm writing this one week into September but already know that so much money has been raised – all of which will be going directly to fund Research into Children's Cancer via the #PearlPower fund - run by the Children's Cancer & Leukaemia Group (CCLG), one of the UKs leading charities in this area.

But equally important and the whole point of the GoGoldSeptember campaign is the raising of awareness of the facts about Childhood Cancer, and Hassocks.... I think that we've done that brilliantly.

Here are the 10 Facts if you didn't manage to find all the posters around the village:

1. Cancer is the most common cause of death in children aged 1-14yrs.

2. 1 in 500 children will develop cancer by age 14. Of







those, 1 in 5 will not survive.

3. 'Surviving' childhood cancer simply means living for 5 years after diagnosis.

4. Causes of childhood cancer are not well understood, and the incidence of childhood cancer is increasing.

5. In 80% of children diagnosed with cancer, it will have already spread by the time it has been found.

6. Childhood cancer is not one disease, there are many different types each with very different symptoms and each needing different treatments.

7. Whilst hundreds of drugs have been developed to treat adult cancer, only 4 have ever been designed specifically for children.

8. Most chemotherapy drugs used on children have not been updated in 30 years. Some are as old as 60 years.

9. Despite children often being used to advertise large cancer charities, little of their money is targeted on children. Cancer Research UK only allocates 1.4% of their research money to children's cancer.

10. The new field of individualised immunotherapy to treat children's cancer is very promising but the lack of research funding means that progress is held back.

So there is still much to do, but we are really making a difference.

Hassocks Goes Gold will be an annual event and I'm hoping it will grow even bigger than this year – so let's get Gold planning for September 2020!

Since the formation of the Hurstpierpoint Gymnastics Club in 1980, British Gymnastics Awards have been gained by the gymnasts every term. Well over 100 awards are earned each term and now the Club will be presenting its 1,000th Award Seven.

Over 1,000 Award 4s, Award 5s and Award 6s have been gained in the past thirty-nine years, with over 600 winning the coveted Award 1. The Award scheme starts at Award 8 and progresses in difficulty to Award 1 followed by Advanced Proficiency Awards - Bronze, Silver & Gold.

The hardest badges to gain are the Gold Floor and Gold Vault awards, where only 15 of each have ever been won. The newest Gold winner is Chloe Wright who has now received her Gold Vault. To achieve this award she has mastered hand-spring vaults, trampette somersaults and other skills. Kitchen Carousel Itd

Established in Ditchling for over thirty years

To renew or refurbish your kitchen that is the question! We also do bedrooms!

Over the past twelve months we have completed over twenty kitchen projects in Hassocks, Hurstpierpoint and Ditchling. Around half of these projects have been refurbishments. In some cases we just changed the tired, old, brown oak doors for something fresh and bright. Sometimes we redesigned the kitchen to accommodate an eye level oven or a tall fridge freezer. I have become an expert in designing cupboards that give our [maturing] local citizens better accessibility. [Less bending down!] Sometimes we changed the worktops. On occasions we kept *one half* of the kitchen and just changed the sink and cooking area.

My name is Stephen Hamilton. I have over thirty years experience in designing and then making kitchens. Now I am a little older and wiser I prefer to work closer to home. When I was young I designed and built some of the most luxurious kitchens imaginable and in 1988 I was European kitchen designer of the year. I even designed and made kitchens for clients in New York and Geneva. I still do luxurious bespoke kitchens. As long as your local! You'd be amazed how much more reasonable our prices are than the big boys with expensive showrooms!

When I first started my career, I designed the interiors of boats. That taught me to maximise space. Now I find I am often asked to try and design very small kitchens. I enjoy the challenge.

A few months ago, in Grand Avenue, I designed a kitchen in a 1930's bungalow. The kitchen was only eight feet by eight feet. I manged to fit in: A tall fridge freezer, a tall, eye level oven, three huge sets of pan drawers and more worksurface than before. Mrs F was amazed and is still looking at the spare space in her drawers.

In April I redesigned a kitchen for Mrs B in St Georges park. They have beautifully appointed apartments but the kitchen design leaves a little to be desired. I kept eighty per cent of the existing carcasses but fitted over a dozen new drawers which greatly increased accessibility. It has transformed Mrs B's kitchen experience. Cost? Around ten thousand pounds.

Sometimes however, a new kitchen is essential. Sometimes people *don't even know* if they *want* a complete new kitchen. Which is where I come in. We give *genuine* advice. Sometimes it goes in stages. If I feel we can accommodate your kitchen design requirements without the palaver of ripping the whole kitchen we will advise accordingly. A brand new kitchen is messy. To do it properly one has to rip the everything out and then, almost always, replaster the walls to make good. Appliances are often moved so new electrics are required ...quite often we move doorways. A refurbishment can take maybe five/six/ seven days but a complete kitchen from start to finish is usually around three weeks. Do you want the hassle? Or the expense? Many of our clients go on holiday whilst we do the work.

I always try to work within your budgets!

A refurbishment with all new doors and worktops and refitting etc generally costs between five thousand and eight thousand pounds. A new kitchen? It all depends. And that's the point. A *small* total kitchen project can be anything from ten to fifteen thousand pounds. It depends what appliances you choose and what services need moving.

With over thirty years experience in all sorts of planning situations I can usually come up with *several different* alternatives you may not have considered. Because we are 'bespoke' and because we make all our cabinets and drawers whatever size is required we have so much more flexibility than the average kitchen company.

When I come to give my first appraisal I do not come with the intention of selling you more than you need. I am happy to just change your doors and drawers if that is what you want.

In April I got a call from Mrs P in Greenlands close burgess hill. She told me her oven was packing up. Could I help her? I arranged to see her. One thing led to another...the cupboards were really beyond recovery. It seemed to me Mrs P really needed a *completely new kitchen*. [Mrs P is 90 going on about 60] The electrics looked dangerous. I scribbled some ideas...one thing led to another. Now Mrs P is whizzing about in her brand new kitchen. We had to rip the old one out, thanks to **Jon and his son Ryan**, plaster the walls, thanks to **John Evans Plastering**, completely reconfigure the plumbing, thanks to **Richard and Ian Thompson**, who have several generations of reputation as local Hassocks plumbers. Only then could we fit a new kitchen. Thanks to **Ian and Liam**, [chief kitchen installation engineers] Mrs P eventually chose one of our classic ash marquetry kitchens] then we tiled the walls, **[Ian** again!] We re-designed and hid the boiler. That was me **Stephen Hamilton**, then we refloored the whole kitchen and dining room [**Homecall** from Burgess Hill]. Then we decorated top to bottom. [**Jon** again!] Five weeks! Although I am the designer I am also the project manger. Mrs P was brilliant. When we first ripped out it became apparent that the electrics were dangerous so we rewired the entire place and fitted a new fuse box [thanks to **Keith Hand**] The Cost? Around twenty thousand pounds. Was it worth it? You'd need to talk to Mrs P about that! Everyone engaged in the project is local.

I understand how big a decision and how big a commitment a new kitchen or even a refurbishment can be. I understand that *initially* you just want some ideas...to explore the *possibilities* and this is where we are building our reputation. We work locally, we only use local reputable tradesmen. We are patient and thoughtful.

If you have a new kitchen we start off by emptying all your cupboards into plastic storage boxes. Then we store and label them and return the contents to the new cupboards.

We are meticulous about covering all the floors and keeping dust and disruption down to a minimum.

We have a brilliant range of doors and worktops. But you know what! I find we frequently don't talk, specifically, about the door and drawer design until much later. I am just about to do a kitchen in Wivels-field for Mr and Mrs D. The project is signed and sealed and deposits paid but we are still discussing the final design. I took them to look at granites and stones at the stone manufacturers. Now we are going to take a trip to east London to look at their selection of Burr oak veneers. Why am I wittering on? Because I want to let people know that we are **not** a faceless national kitchen company, blinding people with false free offers and sales gimmicks. We are hands on. We care.

Our drawers are just brilliant. You have to *try them* to know what I mean. They are traditionally made with proper dovetails in our own workshops in Ditchling. They come all the way out and they take tons of stuff! I train all our apprentices in proper drawer making.

We have showrooms you can visit but you can also visit some of the kitchens we have finished ...probably just around the corner from you.

I hope this gives you some idea of what we are about. If you are interested in a new or refurbished kitchen I do hope you will give me a call. I don't charge for my planning service if you live within a fivesix mile radius of Hassocks. On my first visit I simply talk to you about what you might like. I discuss the problems you have with your existing kitchen and then scribble some alternative plans. Then I will leave you to mull them over. There is no rush and no pressure. Early planning is essential. Planning makes for the perfect project.

NEWS FROM STONEYWISH The biggest stir on the farm this month is the arrival of five new piglets, recently installed with their mother in a roomy run in the farm centre. This patch of well-nosed ground offers up earth minerals and weeds to delight a foraging nose, shade under the hedge where hot piglets can scamper in comfort and a mud wallow, regularly replenished with water, for a cool soak on a scorching summer's day. To the casual human eye it's a poor piece of real estate, but then we can't savour soil the way a pig can. With a Wessex Saddleback mother and an Oxford Sandy and Black father, these piglets have come out all colours: ginger, ginger with spots, black, black with white midriff and brindled black and tan. Autumn is providing all the windfalls a grateful pig can eat. And what else can you do with so many apples? Ditchling, now rightly proud of its 'community orchard' was once plentifully supplied with fruit nurseries, whose trees, provided scrumping (and tummy-ache) opportunities for generations of children. There was Catchpole's just next to Stoneywish, in Spatham Lane. Shirleys was an orchard, as was Orchard Lane, and the very house names in the village testify to the importance of growing-your-own: Cherry Tree Cottage, Walnut Tree Cottage and Mulberry Cottage, in East End Lane alone. What better way could a young Tom Sawyer find to while away his truant hours, than hiding up in somebody's outhouse, nibbling green walnuts? No need for an i-phone. The problem is that the fruit comes all in a rush. A crowd of starlings may swarm in and polish off the dogwood berries at a sitting. And squirrels take care of the hazelnuts. And our blackbird ate every cherry on our cherry tree, with frantic imprecations hurled at any competitor who approached while he was gorging.

But apples?

The whole process of collecting and preserving food for the winter demands hours and days. It demands an involvement which was once a necessity, but also a labour of love. For families trapped in towns, annual forays for blackberries were a celebratory event. One account from the early 20th century, describes a general exodus from Brighton, with whole families, swarming onto buses, or marching on foot to the open Downs, armed with buckets and baskets and sandwiches and returning with their harvest for next stage of bottling and jelly-making. Exercise, fresh air, gnat bites, laughter and pudding, all for free! Of course if you think of time as money, you cannot make an economical case for this hands-on approach to food. But not all cultures buy into the time=money equation. Having a long and slow relationship with one's food can open up a surprising dimension in which time is not lost or saved, but simply lived. In country cottages, when time was slow, food matured and fermented over months, sharing living space with the family. There might be bacon up the chimney, and pickles in the larder and apples in the attic. Every farmhouse had its dairy for cheese and a still room where herbs were dried and wines matured. After the long months of growing produce, came further months of curing and preparing. In some cultures, every stage of the process brought its own songs and dances and rituals. Eating the food then arrived as the culmination of whole seasons of loving attention and everyone who had been involved was sure





to appreciate it. The wonderful thing is that most foods need just a little help to kick off the maturing process. Starting a batch of bread or yoghurt can be as simple as pie. And suddenly, once they are off, the kitchen becomes a true *living* space, where the link between food and life is plain to see. With everyone warning of post-Brexit shortages, I cannot help thinking we should save those apples and love them and spend some time with them. Have you room on your shelf for a cider vinegar jar? Or an airy space where you can dry fine slices for winter muesli? No plastic. No recycling needed. And a breath of autumn every time you taste them!

AN EXTREMELY RARE LAWNMOWER IS THE LATEST EXHIBIT TO BE DISPLAYED AT THE MUSEUM OF GARDENING IN HASSOCKS. Following World War One, labour was in short supply, with most mowers requiring two people or a pony to operate them. This resulted in the mower pusher being designed in 1922 to motorise push and pony mowers requiring only one person to operate them.

The mower pusher was coupled to the rear of the mower with the operator sitting above a powerful 269cc Villiers two-stroke engine. It was capable of pushing mowers up to 36in cutting width and also pulling heavy rollers.

By the mid to late 1920s motor mowers were being mass produced and there was little demand for mower pushers, and with only a minimal number of pushers being sold very few have survived.

Clive Gravett curator of the museum unearthed this fine example in Sept 2018, having rescued it from a barn where it had been for over 50 years because the building



was due for demolition to make way for the HS2 rail project.

"A decision was made to undertake a full r e st o r a t i o n with the help of the museum's talented and d e d i c a t e d group of volunteers", explains Clive. "The



mower pusher has been restored to its former glory over a ten-month restoration period which required some parts to be replicated and many hours of rust removal and cleaning back to bare metal, before re-painting.

Clive, pictured on the machine, adds: "The mower pusher is a fantastic exhibit especially its development to fulfil a need following the Great War."

The museum situated within the South Downs Heritage Centre is operated on behalf of The Budding Foundation a charity supporting local young people.
