<u>OLDLAND WINDMILL MILLER PHOTOGRAPH</u> Hi folks, I have been trying to identify the family lined up in the image outside of Oldlands Mill House, behind Oldland Windmill in Keymer. It's a wonderful picture, and we felt it may have been shot on the date of Queen Victoria's Jubilee. We live at the mill house and have an interest in our local history.

The volunteers who maintain Oldland Windmill have also been trying to identify the family in the photograph but are unable to know for sure, so the mystery continues.

We know there are a number of local residents who are descendants of the various millers at Oldlands. A list from Wikipedia of the millers from the 1800's are George Bennett 1819–1828, Joseph Roots Beard 1828–1840, Joseph Winchester 1839–1860, Thomas Ashdown 1860–1869, Jesse Washington White 1869–1891, John Turner 1878–1895, John White 1894–1904 and David Driver 1891–1912.

The mill was built in 1703 so clearly there would have been earlier millers too. Please email QD Stationery ed@villagemagazines.co.uk if you have any info.

SUSSEX POLICE Over the last 6 months Sussex Police have continued to provide high visibility patrols in the Hassocks area in order to deal with and deter antisocial behaviour which is of course a common thread up and down the country. Of all the recorded crime and statistics, anti-social behaviour comes out top.

Since the summer time where we have had more intense interventions within the village, crime in the area took a dip. You can make of figures what you want of course, so on that note I would ask those that can, to have a look at **www.police.uk** and put in Hassocks in the search field. There you will see a very good breakdown of crime specific to your area.

I would point out that the second highest figure relates to Violence and Sexual Offences. At the time of this report this is running at 19.48%.

This does not mean that we have lots of violent people walking the streets of Hassocks. If you were to break this down, the majority will include domestic incidents within people's private houses and therefore under normal circumstances not cause any risk to the wider public.

I will be holding another meet and greet at Adastra Park on the **2nd February** between 12 pm and 2 pm should anyone like to come and have a chat, even if it is just to discuss the crime figures. The last one we did went down very well.

I mentioned a few months ago that I would be supporting your local Speedwatch. I have now been out with them on four occasions, providing high visibility to the village, but also being in a position to enforce the law and hold offenders to account. Disappointingly though, the amount of people that I have reported for speeding offences has gone well into the teens and is rising.

The majority of the offenders are local to the village. **Remember if you need the Police - Emergency 999 Non-Emergency 101 or www.sussex.police.uk (online)**

LOOKING BACK, LOOKING FORWARD Robert Burns memorably compared his situation to that of a mouse whose nest he had accidentally destroyed, condemning it to death. He felt his own plight was far worse. The mouse was concerned only about the present, whilst Burns could recall his past troubles, and as for the future, 'tho' I canna see, I guess and fear'. As we enter 2020, many of us, including HKD Transition, cannot help sometimes feeling that we have much in common with Burns.

That enigmatical title describes the coming together of Hurstpierpoint, Hassocks, Keymer and Ditchling residents who are concerned with climate change, and, although at times deeply depressed when confronted with more and more scientific evidence of global warming, cling to the belief that there is much that can still be done by individuals. We can move (transit) towards a zero carbon society, away from our profligate use of the world's resources. Formed in 2009, HKD has grown steadily and now over 450 people subscribe to our monthly on line newsletter whilst a whole range of initiatives is paving the way towards reducing the carbon imprint of our villages.

Perhaps the most significant is our pressure for improving the B2116 for cyclists between Ditchling and Hurst. HKD chairs the Mid Sussex Cycle Forum and works closely with our local Councillors. The vibes are good.

We now have a 'bike box' at Stonepound crossroads and, at long last, plans are being made to make the route between the centre of Hurst and Downlands School more bike-friendly. A safe cycle route to school, making the 'school car run' obsolete and thus reducing the pollution level at Stonepound, is no longer just a pipe dream.

Again, on the larger scale, our sister organisation, HKD Energy, aims to increase the amount of renewable energy generated in our area. The 2015 80kW Downlands School Solar Project continues to operate very successfully with over 300 solar panels reducing the school's energy costs and yielding a financial return to local investors. The group is now working with other community energy groups and Network Rail to examine the feasibility of solar panels providing power to the railways.

Fortunate as we are in living in a spring line village at the foot of the South Downs, it means that we are also at risk from flooding, increased in recent years by the changes in rainfall patterns. Short, sharp but very heavy rainfalls are becoming more frequent, and our streams and drainage systems cannot always cope. Working closely with our helpful local councillors, Mid Sussex District Council and WSCC staff, plus funding from Operation Watershed and Hassocks Community Organisation, has enabled us to introduce Sustainable Drainage Systems (SuDS) to our area. This is a proven means of

reducing flood risk by mimicking nature and 'slowing the flow' of water entering drains and streams. Such 'systems' can be as simple as an extra rain butt or a rain box planter attached to a roof downpipe or more sophisticated such as the rain garden in Adastra Park where an interpretation board shows all our SuDS interventions.

More interventions are planned in the countryside between the Downs and Hassocks. In 2020 we hope to start intensive tree planting, working with Downlands School Eco Group and the Ouse & Adur Rivers Trust. Trees lessen flooding by absorbing and holding water in the soil, whilst it is claimed that 48 lb of carbon dioxide is absorbed yearly for every tree planted. Cash and volunteers will be needed, but our waterlogged fields and footpaths will benefit.

Throughout the year, HKD groups are involved in occasional stream clearing, maintaining the debris dams on the Lagg and Herring streams, stream biodiversity surveys, bird walks, moth walks and, recently a very successful guided stream walk. Ditchling youth groups have been involved since 2013 in planting and caring for the Village Orchard and revelling in the annual Apple Day with its welly wanging, apple fritters and apple juicing. The Giant's Garden is a new HKD venture – a magic popup garden for children of all ages which focuses on storytelling, foraging, magic gardening and wild crafting.

Working together in small groups strengthens our community and is a powerful antidote to depression. 'Having

On Thursday **16th January** we have the brilliant Korean drama, Burning, a mystery thriller based on a story by Japanese writer Haruki Murakami; a psychological drama set in the modern Korea. When Jong-su meets vivacious Haemi he knows she is way out his league, but to his delighted surprise she takes up with him and they start a relationship. So when he goes to pick her up from the airport on her return from a trip, he is shocked to see she has a new man in tow, Ben, an obviously wealthy, very smooth young man. Burning is a brilliantly made one-off; puzzling, intelligent and ultimately mesmerising.

Maggie Gyllenhaal is utterly brilliant as Lisa Spinelli, a kindergarten teacher by day, who takes poetry classes by night. Her two worlds collide when a five-year-old Jimmy Roy (Parker Sevak) reveals himself to be a poetic prodigy. Anxious to protect his gift from a world she believes doesn't understand, her fascination with the boy spills over into obsession. This smart, sharp film entrances with the deceptive simplicity of the complex matters it deals with and is a showcase for the brilliance of Maggie Gyllenhaal and a reminder she is among the best actors working today.

On Thursday **13th February**, is a film like no other you will have seen, The Chambermaid. Lila Avilés's terrifically assured first feature finds magic in the routines of a young hotel worker. Gabriela Cartol plays Eve, a maid in a luxurious Mexico city hotel working on the 21st floor, who dreams of promotion to the glamour and additional pay and perks of the VIP floor, the 42nd. Diligent and conscientious, she amuses herself by sifting through guests' possessions to get insights into their lives. When she has interactions with guests, some are weird, some funny, some infuriating. Cartol gives a wonderful performance, filled with humour and poignancy in this superbly atmospheric film.

DITCHLING FILM SOCIETY Our first film of the New Year will be shown on Thursday, 9th January and is entitled Shoplifters. The story is influenced by the Japanese recession, including media reports of how people live in poverty and resort to shoplifting. Set in Tokyo, a Japanese couple, Osamu and Nobuyo, stuck with part-time jobs and hence inadequate incomes, avail themselves of the fruits of shoplifting to make ends meet. They are not alone in this behaviour as the younger and the older of the household are in on the act. However, the unusual routine is about to change from carefree and matter-of-fact to something more dramatic as the couple open their doors to Juni, a beleaguered young girl. The reasons for the family's habit and their motivations come under the microscope and this excellently scripted film is an eye-opening look at a working class family in Japan just trying simply to make ends meet.

Set among a community of Jehovah's Witnesses, two sisters, Alex and Luisa and their mother are united in their devotion but as Luisa starts to question the advice of her elders, she makes a transgression that leaves the whole family in fear of God's wrath. This startling and bold debut film is a thoughtful exploration of faith and, more particularly, fundamentalism – the hope of God and the potential prison of religion.

Our second film in February on Thursday, **20th Febru**ary is entitled Capernaum. Set in Beirut, this is a heartbreaking and emotional film with flashes of humour and two astonishing child performances – a gripping sympathetic cry for the dispossessed.

EARTHWORMS: WITHOUT WHOM NONE OF THIS WOULD BE POSSIBLE. We can spend all day planting and pruning, weeding and seeding, grunting and groaning in our gardens but it's time to face the facts folks. Us gardeners aren't the ones who are doing the hard work. The real toil is in the soil – the engine room of the garden. Because down there, beneath our wellies, earthworms are wriggling, recycling and reincarnating our gardens.

They're so easily taken for granted. An earthworm isn't much to look at. A tube made of muscles with a mouth at one end and a bum at the other but he and she (they're hermaphrodites) is responsible for making your garden grow. These burrowing beauties really mix it up in the mud. Some drag dead leaves deep underground while their wormcasts return essential minerals back to the surface. This improves soil structure and their tiny tunnels help with drainage and allow aeration.

Cleopatra declared them to be sacred and Aristotle called earthworms 'the intestines of the soil'. Indeed, at some point every bit of your garden would have passed through a worm's belly. They munch their way through dead organic matter and make it available to even smaller decomposers - fungi and bacteria - who break it down even further. The nutrients released are

reabsorbed by our plants. What once was dead is returned to the living. It's one of those 'circle of life' things.

There's about 3000 different earthworm species worldwide with around 27 native species in Britain. There's lobs under your lawn and brandlings in your compost bin. Some species live in leaf litter others dig deep in the soil. There could be up to 2 million worms working underground in an area the size of a football pitch.

Earthworms are part of a wildlife workforce that lives in your garden and provides an essential service for free. Birds, bees, beetles, fungi, hoverflies, woodlice and many others volunteer for us as pollinators, pest controllers, decomposers and recyclers. All we need to do is give them a home and leave them to it and they'll get on with the dirty work.

But it's the earthworm who is seen as the kingpin of the whole operation. "It may be doubted whether there are many other animals which have played so important a part in the history of the world as these lowly organised creatures". Charles Darwin said that – and I'm not going to argue with him. We just can't live without them. So it's about time we start paying earthworms some respect and attention. Because when we're all dead and buried they'll be paying a whole lot of attention to us. *Michael Blencowe*

HASSOCKS PREHISTORIC UP TO 20TH CEN-TURY The area first became a centre of population around 20,000 years ago during the Stone Age. These people were mostly nomadic until approximately 5,000 years ago. Around this time, the first farmers settled on and around the South Downs, a mile to the south of the village. They travelled from the continent, bringing with them various types of farming livestock. Evidence of their existence has been found in the form of tools and dwellings around Stonepound Crossroads and in the Parklands area.

Around 600 B.C. the first metal workers came to the area with the beginning of the Bronze Age, and a good example of an Iron Age fort is to be found on the top of the nearby Wolstonbury Hill on the South Downs.

The area was colonised by the Romans and a Roman cemetery was found by Stonepound Crossroads. Modern Hassocks is thought to have stood at a Roman crossroads on the London to Brighton Way between Londinium Augusta (modern London) to Novus Portus (possibly modern Portslade) (running north-south) and the Greensand Way Roman road from modern Hardham to a north-south road at Barford Mills north of Lewes and possibly further to Pevensey. With the demise of the Roman Empire came an influx of Anglo-Saxons and the eventual reintroduction of stone buildings, such as the parish church of St. John the Baptist in the nearby village of Clayton, which is believed to have been built around the 11th Century.



19th and 20th centuries - The opening on 21st September 1841 of Hassocks Gate station (named after the nearby toll gate on the turnpike road to Brighton, but now known simply as Hassocks) on the London to Brighton railway saw the beginning of the village that we know today. South of the village the railway passes beneath the chalk escarpment of the South Downs through Clayton Tunnel, which at 6,777 feet (2,066 m) is the longest of the five tunnels on the railway. The north entrance of the tunnel is distinguished by a castellated portal with a dwelling house between the two towers. The latter might have been built for the use of the man who had to look after the gas lighting in the tunnel (for several years after opening the interior of the tunnel was whitewashed and lit by gas lamps, presumably to allay the fears of early railway travellers). In 1861 a collision between two trains within the tunnel killed 23 people and injured 176 others.

In the 1930s the Grand Avenue residential area, along with several other roads, was developed by George Ferguson on the site of former orchards and the Orchard Pleasure Gardens. A special feature of the Hassocks Homes development ordered by Mr Ferguson was the planting of flowering cherry trees along the main roads.

1939 saw the beginning of World War II, and the closure of the cinema in September of that year for the duration (it was still going in the 1950's). Evacuations then began from London bringing an additional 1,250 to the population. Info from Wikipedia
