

YEW TREES IN THE CHURCHYARD In your February issue Mr Blencowe tells us all about churchyard yew trees. Very interesting and all of it new 'knowledge' for me. As a boy living in south London, my father dragged me round many churches mainly in Surrey, because he had a great interest in church history and architecture. He was a schoolmaster and Saturdays and Sundays were just an extension of his weekday work but with only his 3 sons to talk to. This he did in an embarrassingly loud booming voice which attracted the attention of other visitors to the church. Sometimes, to his surprise and our pleasure he received a tip and we converted it into ice cream cornets as soon as possible.

The churchyard yew tree was of interest to me because of its age and purpose. The only story I was ever told (and confirmed many years later when I became churchwarden at Westmeston Church of St Martin) does not seem to be known to Mr Blencowe.

In mediaeval times the village church and churchyard were very important and central to the life of the community. The churchyard was

the only green open space where village people met and children played after the church services.

Gravestones - so familiar today - were not invented until Victorian times. St Martins Fair, granted to Westmeston in 1312AD, was held in the graveyard to the north of the church where only poor people were buried. This caused the land to the south of the church to become raised as body after body was interned there. Most village churches had to have a charnel chamber as fresh burials revealed the bones of previously interred villagers. In Westmeston church the charnel chamber was discovered a few years ago to be under the central aisle of the church.

Before the invention of barbed wire, farmers fences were of poor quality and thorn hedges



were relied upon to retain stock. As there were no motor cars a cow would be safe if it broke through the hedge and grazed on the verges of the tracks, as roads were before Mr MacAdam in the mid-19th century.

The Rector was certainly not having loose cows trampling the fresh graves in the churchyard. To prevent this a yew tree was planted and so it was clear to farmers with land close to the church that stock could not have any chance to break out. The Rector did not want to poison any animal and the yew tree was there as a warning to local farmers.

All this stuff was told to me in my young boyhood in the 1920s and remained firmly in my mind. I know that it was correct because after all, he was a schoolmaster.

place. My mother was Florrie Diplock, Charley's daughter, before her marriage to my father, Frederick Maskell, in 1935.



BRIMSTONE BUTTERFLY This lockdown has certainly felt harder because of the winter. Don't get me wrong, I've enjoyed the bleak beauty of the season: bare trees, frosted landscapes. But now I need something to get my heart racing. I need a sign – some hope in these challenging times, a promise of those dynamic spring months ahead, a flash of colour. In March my light at the end of the tunnel is an oncoming butterfly.

On sculpted, vibrant yellow wings the brimstone butterfly makes his elegant entrance into the New Year on those bright March days when you feel the warmth of the sun on your face. Its distinctive yellow wings have given birth to a legend – that this 'butter-coloured fly' was the inspiration for the word butterfly. This claim may be a myth and it's also untrue that these March brimstones are the first signs of the year's new life. By the time brimstones appear in March they are already on their last (six) legs. Fresh brimstone butterflies emerged





from their chrysalises in late summer, so by now they could be seven months old – and in butterfly years that's ancient. Admittedly, almost all of that time they've been asleep in a hedge, sheltered from the storms under holly and ivy. Yet despite the worst winter weather they always emerge immaculate in the spring. They must be made of Teflon. When they awake the (bright yellow) males search for a mate, they mate, the (pale yellow) females lay eggs and then both die. Still, an adult life of over ten months earns them the title of our longest-lived butterfly. An insect OAP.

The brimstone's caterpillars feed on the leaves of buckthorn and alder buckthorn, unobtrusive shrubs which. like the butterfly, widespread are Sussex. across When I first became the proud owner of a garden it was only a matter of days be-

fore I evicted the gnomes and planted an alder buckthorn. The following spring I was excited to watch a brimstone laying her tiny skittle shaped eggs and I studied the caterpillars as they hungrily defoliated my tree, content in the knowledge that I was doing my bit to raise the following year's brimstone brigade.

My first brimstone sighting each year doesn't exactly mean that spring is starting but it's certainly a sign that winter is starting to end. And, after the tough winter that we've all just suffered, that's good enough for me. Either way, this beautiful yellow butterfly is a welcome messenger of what's to come – the first sulphurous spark to ignite the blaze of spring. Let's hope that with the spring comes hope for
