weeks of sunshine have brought the kind of Spring one dreams of for a lifetime. The natural world throws all caution to the winds and seizes the moment. That evil storm of February is a distant memory; next week's forecast of snow is pure supposition. Nature lives only in the present which, just now, is carpeted with windflowers and dog violets along quiet country paths and serenaded with birdsong. The pussy willows are transfigured as they bury themselves in a froth of seal-grey catkin fur and golden pollen: heaven for the fat bumblebees which hum in the canopy. Only humans note the massive limbs recently torn from trees and anxiously consult their phones to see whether it is safe to put out their bedding plants. Of course, it isn't! It is still March. The windflowers have the wisdom of a thousands of winters encoded into their fragile memory. They have seen it all before. Through warm periods, cool periods, mini-ice-ages, they have gone on seizing the moment, colonising an inch of ground at a time,

wherever the opportunity arose. They are truly wild. Truly old. Like the natives of Sussex, they 'won't be druy'. I have tried planting them in the Nature Reserve, selecting the perfect spot, giving them the optimum conditions, loving, hoping, waiting... Nothing! The same with violets. But the violets have now decided this place is good and are moving in fast of their own accord. We have one patch of 'original' hedgebank where dog's mercury grows in spring and the diminutive moschatel, both plants with simple green flowers, which come and mind their own business and disappear each year without anyone much noticing. They are perhaps our oldest residents. When we see a veteran oak, we know it is old. But a veteran patch of untilled ground has its own equal mystery and magic. Windflowers grow on the site of ancient woodland coppice. Bluebells are indicators of the same. It is hard to imagine how something as vulnerable and temporary as a flower, or a lump of moss, a fragment of lichen, can be an 'elder' too. But something happens to land which is left to find its own coherence. Yes, without the grazing of larger animals, there comes scrub and nettles and everything gardeners deplore, but a larger landscape without larger animals is like a body without one of its vital organs. If there are no passing deer or wild boar, then humans may have to 'graze' and rootle in their stead. But if a community of plants is allowed to establish itself naturally, then eventually the 'elders' may be enticed to return and bring their magic with them. The slowness is all. Stability and continuity are all. One could make a GM wildflower meadow in a season, but it would require the interventions of Roundup and ploughing before it could be sown for another year. It may take 30 years or more for the veterans we love to

re-colonize a patch of ground. Too long for moderns to wait. But there is a much better and more fulfilling way for us to benefit, which is by not turning our own ground continually upside down. That way we can inherit the years already allowed by others to whichever plot we happen to land on. Suppose everyone kept a wild corner - not for bug-hotels and seed-packs of beefriendly flowers from the Garden Centre, though by all means have those somewhere - but a patch of land which is allowed to evolve in peace? Suppose we were each, in our own way, to invite the 'elders' to come amongst us once more, to create, or rather allow pockets of wildness in our midst without ascribing to them any human-serving agenda? Such spaces, loosely linked, might constitute an alternative landscape where Man and Nature could exist in trust and where the intelligence and integrity of Nature could speak to us, cautioning against our collective catastrophic will to power. This will not help the skylarks which have nested where the bulldozers are already at work. But it will keep alive in our minds and hearts the memory of a world whose wisdom is older than ours, quieter, more

They organised a number of events around the village and in school they set up a cake sale. There was an excited buzz from the children in the morning as all the donated cakes were collected in. They were then even more excited to sell and eat these after school. Thank you so much to the wonderful parents for organising this and supporting the challenging situation in Ukraine. Thanks to all those who brought cakes or baked for the sale, an amazing £523 was raised! Two weeks prior to this, the parents were incredibly generous in their support of Red Nose day raising a staggering £713.50 for those in most need.

During the spring term Year 3 have continued their learning on Ancient Greece, looking at Greek art, vases and columns. They have also been representing patterns in different ways and making their own Greek pots and temples in multimedia, which they were very passionate about. A couple of weeks ago, Year 4 took part in Titanic

day. By using props and costumes, and dancing to music from the era, the children were able to experience what life may have been like for the different social classes on board RMS Titanic. In Maths, the children have been learning about symmetry and have been exploring horizontal, vertical and diagonal lines of symmetry using the Numicon shapes on a baseboard. Then the tables were turned, and the children designed their own trail for the leaders to navigate! Both activities were great fun and provided the chance to work cooperatively, share ideas, problem solve

and think creatively. The children all made the most of this opportunity and approached their tasks with real enthusiasm and team spirit.

**IMPROVING BIODIVERSITY IN OUR VIL-LAGES WITH NO MOW MAY** After the success of last year's No Mow May campaign Hurst Rethink and HKD Transition invite the residents of our villages to once again make our gardens more nature friendly by not mowing our lawns in the month of May. By coming together en masse to take part in the charity Plantlife's 'No Mow May' campaign, we can collectively make a real difference to local wildlife - and pollinators in particular.

In the UK, we have lost nearly 7.5 million acres of flower-rich meadow and pasture since the 1930s, and now only 1% of our countryside provides flowers for pollinators.

However, there are 15 million gardens in the UK and our lawns have the potential to be a major wildflower nectar source - a staggering 200 species are known to grow on lawns. In fact, incredibly simple changes in mowing can result in enough nectar from common flowers such as daisies, dandelions, buttercups and clover for ten times more bees and other pollinators. More bees and other insects also mean more food for creatures further up the food chain - so by encouraging those at the bottom, we benefit many more.

Our local campaign in Hurstpierpoint & Sayers Common, Hassocks and Ditchling supports a national survey run by the charity Plantlife called 'Every Flower Counts'.

In 'No Mow May' we simply ask that you leave your mower in the shed for the month of May, then record what flowers you have on a sample of your

**RAVEN** May 14th 1264. The aftermath of the battle. Two thousand corpses lie strewn on the slopes and riverbanks around Lewes. Some view this as a victory; for others this is defeat. But for a large, black bird who has calmly watched the bloodshed from the side-lines, this scene of slaughter is an allyou-can-eat buffet. Democracy never tasted so good.


Smart birds, Ravens. Way before 1264 they'd realised they needn't waste their energy killing to eat when other less intelligent species can do the dirty work for them. For centuries Ravens exploited man's enthusiasm for resolving quarrels with clubs and swords. Ravenous Ravens dined out at all the finest battlefields, burial grounds, gibbets and gallows.

Hanging around with corpses would get anyone a bad reputation but the Raven's took on mythological proportions. Across the northern hemisphere the bird became respected and revered by many cultures as an omen of death, denizen of the afterlife, messenger of defeat. This sinister CV secured them a plethora of portentous appearances in everything from the Old Testament to Game of



Thrones. The sight of a Raven struck fear in the heart of man who would dare not harm it. Today Ravens still occur in our folklore as the earthbound spirit of King Arthur, and at the Tower of London the birds are entrusted with the fate of the kingdom. Yet aside from all the make-believe malevolent accolades bestowed on the Raven, it truly is magnificent to watch. As befits Britain's wickedest bird, the Raven certainly dresses the part in a costume of sleek, glossy black feathers, shaggy 'beard' and stout dagger beak. It commands the sky; wheeling on wide wings and uttering its guttural 'cronk cronk' call. Sometimes their behaviour is incongruous with their evil image. To see Ravens rolling and tumbling through the air during their joyous display flight is like catching the grim reaper doing the hokey-cokey.

When not busy instilling fear in the population, Ravens performed an important clean-up job ridding Britain's towns of rotting rubbish and the bird was protected by royal decree. But in the 17th century people's perceptions changed and for centuries the birds were persecuted. Ravens, and the old beliefs they represented, were exorcised from Eng-







land. By 1895 they had vanished from Sussex. But informed, tolerant attitudes have recently allowed Ravens to return. They mostly breed on our chalk cliffs and quarries but can be seen flying over our towns and cities. In our comfortable world of surround sound and selfies there is something reassuringly sinister about watching a Raven circling overhead; a spectral souvenir of our brutal, primitive past. Sussex will never again be the site of a bloody revolutionary battle. But there's no harm in a few Ravens hanging around. Just in case.



Perhaps if you had asked the 'tall gentleman' you would have found out that the snowdrops were in fact being planted.

I think a few facts are in order.

John Gray, the Field Society Outings Coordinator, organized a yearly trip to a venue with snowdrops. When he sadly died in 2007, as then Chairman of the Parish Councils Environment Committee, I suggested that we planted a large number of snowdrops in the Memorial Garden.

This we did, paid for by the Hassocks Field Society and this was well received by the Society and the Village.

The following year I suggested that each year Mrs Gray and myself plant more bulbs, purchased by the Field Society. Since then we have planted over 9,000 snowdrops in the green, observed and approved by many passing villagers.

As Chairman of Hassocks Horticultural Society I would also point out that you plant with a bulb


