





NEWS FROM STONEYWISH They say that every dog has his day, and today I find myself basking in self-satisfaction, having learnt from friends that weeds are 'in' this year at Chelsea! At last, we are in fashion!! To confirm the fact, I have just made a tour of our carefully neglected, 'designer' garden and counted over 80 species of weeds and wild flowers. These range from common dandelions and buttercups to the thugs of the garden, nettle, hogweed and bindweed, and from medicinal herbs such as woundwort, self-heal and solomon's seal to the scented delights of sweet rocket, honeysuckle, and woodruff. I even found a solitary twayblade, a green-flowered pygmy of the orchid family, which had sown itself in the sawdust of Michael's woodpile and was looking perfectly contented with its lot. Now, in case this looks like bragging, I have to say that I can take very little credit for such botanical profusion. There is a tale of a vicar who, enraptured by a beautiful garden, approached the aged gardener and exclaimed: "What a wonderful job you and God have made of this place!" To which the gardener drily replied: "Yes. You should have seen it when it was just God doing it!" Well, our little paradise has taken twenty years to develop, pretty much all by itself; the lack of human interference being due as much to practical as ideological reasons, i.e., lack of time and the fact that weeding brings me out in a rash! Sometimes things grow and flourish in the 'wrong' places and the garden adjusts itself accordingly. The paths wind round these adjustments and other plants migrate to avoid them. When the garden bullies become too dominant, I do try to take them in hand, but there is no way they can, or perhaps ever should be eliminated. They have their part to play, as do the bugs and slugs. The result is a space which feels somehow whole, in the old sense of the word: 'whole', 'hale', 'healthy'. Each year, new plants arrive and then as mysteriously depart or proliferate. Germander speedwell, cuckoo flower, wild rose, agrimony are newcomers. Gradually they intermingle to create the effect of jewelled carpets, which is how they seem to be happiest. Where balance is attained, even the thugs behave. Everything in this scheme of things is a gift. The blackcurrant bush, the bird cherry, a burnet rose, a viburnam of unknown variety, which is this year covered in flower buds - all are gifts from birds. Are they

Two magpies claimed a birch with a prime view of the area for their nest-site this year. Their offspring are now clumsily flexing soft-feathered wings as they plunge from bough to bough, learning the skills of flight. I thought this would spell disaster for our songbirds. But we have had baby blackbirds, wrens, thrushes, nightingales even, and the continuous taunts of blackcap from patches of thicket. It seems that timing is all. Nature can do it, given the chance. And, though we think of this place as 'our' garden, it is not really necessary for us to know how or why it works. Indeed, there is magic attached to secrets which are left untold. Each year I collect a few handfuls of hawthorn blossom to make a tincture for angina. As with all 'wild-crafting', I browse, taking no more than a few flowers or leaves at a time. The scent of the may, the beauty of the flowers illumined against a blue sky, the sense of being embowered in song, make this one of the most pleasurable tasks of the year. This year I am struck by the uniqueness of the individual trees. They all grow in the same field and might be expected to be of the same genetic stock, yet not only do they bloom at different times, but their flowers are different sizes, are tightly or loosely packed, are creamy or white or tinged with pink. Each grows according to its own secret formula. The medicinal constituents in the flowers, no doubt vary, expressive of the same hidden intelligence. And it strikes me that this intelligence is the secret that lies at the collective heart of Nature and that respecting it, trusting it, is the real key to entering into communion with the wild. Mystery cannot be bought at a flower show, though it might sneak in the back way without a ticket! It is renegade. No respecter of rank. And no sentimentalist. Mankind is afflicted with longings for security, for permanence. But in Nature every moment is a surprise never to be recaptured – a birth and a death. When last I strolled through the Play Area, the mown grass there and the close-cropped adjoining meadow had become a nursery for young starlings. Dozens and dozens of new-fledged birds were waiting and calling as their parents darted about, collecting grubs

efficiency and I stood, watching in wonder for some

time. Instinctively, the regret bothered me that I had not got a camera to hand. It might have been possible to freeze this moment - the never-before-seen, touching intimacy, the sunlight on the grass, a grey heron winging overhead. It might have been possible to 'own' the moment and summon and use it in its photographic form at any time – a way of cheating time. But that would have been to violate in some way the gift which had been offered, for here was the chance to brush against something private and momentary and magical and let the moment go – passing on to the next experience as the heron had done. Being open, receptive, awake - relinquishing the need to appropriate everything for later – brings an attentiveness that is its own reward. We live in an age of illusion. The so-seductive advances of computer technology offer us the chance to assume lordship over life. We can save time, arrest time, re-play time. The present moment can be held on 'catch-up' for those too busy to be present. But doesn't this rob the present of its essence? Who is behind the camera? Where are they? What did they save? On a grander scale, people take the same approach towards the environment. The planet must be saved, preserved, conserved, encrypted, frozen in seedbanks for some impossible future when humans, it is imagined, will have finished pillaging their home. In Philip Brebner's fine novel about the history of Algeria, one of the characters talks of the colonists who have plundered his country. Even the kind ones, he says, are like the sparrowcatcher, who weeps as he wrings the sparrows' necks, but kills them all the same. Are we sentimental colonists? Loving the wildlife, we see on tv, but not wanting it to inconvenience us? The thing about a secret

is that it is vouchsafed. Nature gives us the secrets we

need to know, when we are ready to hear them. Those which are extracted on a pathologist's slab are already

devitalised. Living secrets are vouchsafed - which

means literally that we are 'summoned' or 'vouched' to

receive them, entrusted with them. True secrets have

no commercial value, confer no authority – they are a gift, an inspiration. The recognition that each breath is the cosmos breathing through us – that such breath is given and withdrawn and never returns as the same thing but opens the way for a new breath, should bring enough excitement to fire up an entire lifetime. What need for Artificial Intelligence, with all the environmental destruction and slavery it demands, when the Real Thing, our birthright, is available direct for free? Here is Kabir, dancing between being and non-being in 15th century India: "Between the conscious and the unconscious, the mind has put up a swing:/all earth creatures, even the supernovas, sway between these two trees, and it never winds down./Angels, animals, humans, insects by the million, also the wheeling sun and moon;/ages go by, and it goes on./Everything is swinging: heaven, earth, water, fire,/and the secret one, slowly growing a body. Kabir saw that for fifteen seconds, and it made him a servant for life."

So we hurtle on towards Mid-summer and Michael will say, as he does every year with a kind of perverse relish: "Well, it's downhill all the way, now!" Downhill? Uphill? Winter? Summer? All mere oscillations of the swing. But the important thing about sitting on a swing is the *exhilaration* and I wish you that, just that, every moment of these fleeting summer days. *Rosemary*

As the title suggests, this is a road movie: a family trip by Mom, Dad with his leg in a cast, an eerily taciturn young adult son who drives their packed SUV, his hyperactive little brother and an ailing dog in the back. We're never explicitly told any of the family's names, where they're going or even why, though the older brother's marriage arrangements are vaguely mentioned.

At first, when his parents realise their youngest has smuggled a cell phone along to play music, it seems like a mere cheeky prank – until the mother cuts up the SIM card and promptly hides the handset offroad.

Hit the Road is a tale of family flight and survival, sudden loss and stoic perseverance. In it Panahi Jr weaves together slice-of-life realism with fantasy sequences inspired by Stanley Kubric's 2001: A Space Odyssey. In this culturally eclectic film Panahi Jr is aided by superb performances from his central cast: stage actors Hassan Madjooni and Pantea Panahiha as the parents and long-lashed Rayan Sarlak as the firecracker kid.

This is not only a fantastic film but being set in stunning scenery makes it a must to see on the big screen.



DITCHLING HISTORY PROJECT has been judged one of three runners-up in a nationwide competition run by the National Archives with the British Association for Local History. The

'20sStreets Local History Competition' asked for a story with a link to the 1920's and relating to the 1921 census. The story told by DHP is about the Ditchling stonecarver Joseph Cribb. We knew from Joseph's war time diaries that he had fought with Royal Sussex regiment, was wounded in 1916 and later returned to the Somme area with



the Royal Engineers where he was engaged in marking out the war cemeteries. After the war, until his death in 1967, he worked as a stone carver at the Guild of St Joseph on Ditchling Common. Returning from France, Joseph was busy carving names on war memorials, including the 20 names on Ditchling's memorial, a job completed by August 1920 when the memorial was unveiled. We were then able to trace him, through the 1921 census, to Great Dunmow in Essex where he was in lodgings with his wife Agnes and young son Peter and employed carving 85 names on the town war memorial.

During the Second World War Joseph served in the Home Guard and, when the war was over, he was once again employed both in Ditchling and in Great Dunmow adding the names of the fallen in that conflict. The story was read by a panel of experts from The National Archives, the British Association for Local History and external historians who scored the entries based on agreed criteria. The full story has been published on the National Archives website and you can also read it on the Ditchling History Project website at

STINGING NETTLE In the shadows under the Oak trees my enemy awaits. There are hundreds of them, huddled together in a silent, ferocious mob. With their drab green leaves and insignificant flowers, the Stinging Nettle is a joyless plant infamous only for its ability to inflict pain. I can almost hear these nettles straining at their roots, desperately trying to reach me because I am in possession of something they crave: a pair of bare legs. When I started writing this article, I realised that I hadn't been stung by a Stinging Nettle for so long that I had forgotten what it felt like. So, dear reader, just for you I am wading into a nettle patch in a pair of shorts.

As my legs brush the underside of the nettles' leaves, I break the fragile tips off hundreds of hollow hairs, and I'm injected with histamine, serotonin and acetylcholine, with a splash of formic acid. This volatile cocktail acts like napalm on my knees – my skin itches and blisters and that familiar fiery, tingling, pulsing pain sears up my spinal cord. The plant does not inflict this agony as some sadistic vendetta against schoolchildren and writers. The nettle's hairy, hurtful suit of armour is a defence mechanism against hungry herbivores.

Despite our hatred for the Stinging Nettle, we have found many uses for it over the centuries as cloth, medicine, and food. Seventeenth century Sussex herbalist Nicholas Culpeper claimed nettles - which "can be found by feeling in the darkest night" - cured everything from nosebleeds to leprosy. Celebrity chefs extol the virtues of vitamin-packed nettle soups, risottos and spanakopita. And the caterpillars of our most impressive butterflies

enjoy munching on nettles too. Red Admirals, Peacocks, Commas and Small Tortoiseshells all depend on them.

Halfway through the nettle patch all this is offering me little comfort. If I focus my mind, I can rise above it and the waves of pain can start to feel strangely invigorating. But not for long and I soon start frantically searching for a cure. Rubbing mashed dock leaves on my legs has soothed my stings since I was a schoolboy, so I was surprised to read that it's all a ruse. Scientists claim dock leaves are simply a placebo – and the searching and rubbing is just a distraction that numbs the pain. Beyond the nettle patch I stumbled across an amazing glade of orchids, vibrant and stunning in the sunshine. In an instant the stinging stopped. Maybe it was all in my mind after all. Even when we are in our darkest night we need to keep pushing through the painful patches. There's something

His mother Pam Gasson ran the local riding school at Clayton, she was a very feisty woman, I used to deliver horse feed to the stables and often saw her give a tongue lashing to someone, but that was Pam and she was never about to change. Tony did not have the usual upbringing that most children do and after an unfortunate accident on his motorbike was left with brain damage. His life from start to finish was pretty tragic, he married and had three sons, but his wife died and all three sons were taken into foster care.

A lot of people did try to help him, but he was determined to stay at the cottage provided for him at Clayton stables. His walk from the cottage to Hassocks and back was always a dangerous journey and sadly it was inevitable that one day it would end tragically. Some people did try o get Social Services involved, but you can only help those who want to be helped. Tony lacked communication skills, when he visited the local charity shops the staff often came and got me because they were terrified of him, not that I could do much other than stand with him while he decided what he wanted. The cottage where he lived was recently cleared out, his entire life put in a skip and taken away, the lady who helped with the clear out said you couldn't communicate how awful it was inside. A very sad ending to a very sad life, Tony's funeral was last month RIP Tony

Please do your best to keep feeding the Wildlife be it with fur or feathers. At the moment they are all struggling out there to find natural food, what with habitats being destroyed and a very noticeable lack of insects, whenever I hear of yet another catastrophe somewhere in the world albeit fires, flood or famine my first thought is always for the innocent animals trapped in a world mankind is slowly destroying.
