

TOM DUFTY 29.1.1942 - 19.3.2024 For over forty years a resident of Ditchling and very active member of the village community - died on 19th March. In some of the messages the family received after Tom's death, he was humorously referred to as the 'Mayor of Ditchling' and 'Mr. Ditchling.' These epithets came from Tom being involved in many local clubs, societies and campaigns over the years. Amongst many other things he was: Chair of the Ditchling Society and the village hall, a bellringer at St. Margaret's, one of the original Boxing Day mummers troupe (playing St. George), one of the founders of Chesterton's (the grocery store that used to be where The Green Welly is now) and the Wine Society, an active member of the Ditchling Players (both acting and directing),

and the Ditchling Fair Master (waking everyone across the village with a big bell and a loud voice on fair day). Tom also campaigned vigorously for traffic calming measures in the village and for Ditchling to be included in the South Downs National Park. In his later years he helped produce the neighbourhood plan for the village. He was an important member of the Ditchling History Project and wrote two walking tour guides to the village which are still in print: 'Ditchling in Detail' and 'Walk Around Ditchling Village'. Tom's funeral was held at St Margaret's church on 9th April, and he is buried in the churchyard there. He was loved by many in the village and by his family – Pauline, Richard, Phil and Ros, and his seven grandchildren. Rest in peace Mr. Ditchling. Richard Duftv

NEWS FROM STONEYWISH The cherry blossoms are fading, but I have found new fascinations in Japan, so having extended my 'flying carpet' visit for another month. This time I have set off in the footsteps of the 17th century poet Basho, travelling forest and mountain paths, up and down the country, looking for ancient shrines. I am walking the old ways, described in books before the advent of tarmac and electricity pylons and tourist guides, and I suppose what I am *really* looking for is a way of looking which is not our usual Western way of looking, and the discovery of a world which is not to be acquired, or packaged in tourist photos and information guides, and which cannot be archived for later, a world which belongs uniquely to the here and now. This sounds like a contradiction in terms, surely. How can one hope to find that which defies definition - in a book? Basho's travels are confided in prose and verse. Here he is, teetering along a perilous mountainside, perched high on an overloaded donkey and terrified that every jolt will pitch him headlong into the ravine. That's the prose version, written down by lamplight once he reaches the safety of a lodging-house. The poem inspired by the same experience, is not an account, but a conjuration: 'Onto a bridge/suspended over a precipice/clings an ivy vine,/body and soul together. 'This is something approaching a riddle and in order to crack open its store of meanings one has to leave the safe ground of what can be measured and defined and swing out over the void. Such words are alchemical. Shamanic. They change

things. They themselves become a bridge spanning the dizzying space between one mind and another, one culture and another, one world and another. They use a very ancient way of teaching obliquely, by opening the eyes. In other words, they say, forget data and facts and lists and simply stand where you are and see for yourself. There is an old Chinese saying: "Don't tie your shoes in the melon patch. Don't straighten your hat under a pear tree." i.e. someone will think you are stealing. All students are thieves, stealing the fruit of their teachers' wisdom and then wearing it as their own. To frustrate this 'false' learning, great masters and poets have always taught in parables and riddles which can only be interpreted in moments of sympathetic enlightenment - Reason alone will never do it. As a shameless melon thief, I have been plundering books all my life, ransacking their hidden shrines for wisdom. But many of these books simply silt up the mind with old melon rinds and pips. What one really needs is to let go of the 'safety' of authority and swing out after authenticity. Suspended beyond reach of received certainties, one can then be open to direct experience. And from there the world looks a very different place. The clogged mind begins to clear its blockage of acquired prejudices and fears. The white noise or mental static which bombards the busy brain, subsides and one can begin to slow down - hear birdsong - note the green things in Nature which exist in a different dimension – a haven which, despite all that is perpetrated against them, remains their





native sanctuary home and which should, by rights, belong to us too. The traditional Shinto shrines of Japan, as I understand it, celebrate the source of all life as Great Nature, and the elements of Nature, as genii loci, 'spirits of the place'. These may be trees, rocks, streams, animals - all and any, sparks of the original splendour - and include us too, since we are kindred from the same source. To connect with the 'spirit of the place' is to find a connection with our own being's well-spring. And if this sounds like Wordsworth, in one of his rapturous moments, that is because he is essentially saying the same thing. And now at last I understand why, when I was a volunteer at Dove Cottage, (Wordworth's first home in Grasmere), I saw wave after wave of Japanese tourists arrive to pay homage to a man they 'understood' and who appeared to see the world as from one of their own sacred places. For what it is worth, here is what I managed to smuggle out of the melon patch regarding Japanese shrines. They mostly stand in their own sanctuary grounds of forest and garden, meditative spaces where time is allowed to flow at its own pace. There will be a symbolic gate through which one passes from the empirical secular world outside to

the hidden world within. Even important shrines are often simple and ancient in design, resembling old rice granaries, with heavy thatched roofs and distinctive supporting beams. An imposing approach through avenues of great trees and flights of steps, may culminate in a small, dark, and sparsely furnished building whose inner space is tolerant of other beliefs - and resonant with something undeclared – a mystery. And to awaken the imagination and sense this, is to hear, without needing to set foot there, the drip-drip of rain from the eaves, the drumming of a nearby woodpecker, the rustle of moonlit pine branches. This world is also the world at our own back door at home, if only we can find it. There are 'spirits of the place' here too, not only at the National Trust. How beautiful to stop and let this sanctuary world embrace us, transport us, without our having to manage it, tame it. define it. How beautiful to find that other people can be approached with the same reverence and respect - that they also have their own mysterious interiors which share kinship with our own. With the best of motives, we hardly begin to recognise the violence of our intentions towards our world until we let them drop for a moment, or until

<u>SWIFTS</u> These are uncertain times. Who knows where this planet is heading? But since the start of May I've been looking to the sky for a sign of reassurance: the return of the Sussex Swifts from Africa. Ted Hughes expressed it perfectly: "They've made it again / Which means the globe's still working, the Creation's / Still waking re-

freshed, our summer's / Still all to come."

Swifts may not look like much - they're basically two wings and a mouth but it's hard to explain their abilities without making them sound supernatural. Swifts are all about flying. They feed, scream, and mate in the air and bathe in the rainclouds. At night they switch off half their brain,

switch on cruise control and fall asleep amongst the stars. If they had their way they would never come down. But there's one little flaw in their plan: eggs don't float. So, for just a few weeks of the year, they begrudgingly swap the open skies for a cramped nest under the eaves where they raise their young. The problem is in recent years most of these little gaps have been lost to renovations and modern architecture. The destruction of their homes is one of the reasons why Swift numbers have fallen. They are refugees on the wind.

They cruised into Sussex in May after a non-stop, long-haul flight from Africa; not that this trip bothered them. Swifts are all about flying. For me, the Swift is the only bird that takes pure, unadulterated pleasure in flying. Other birds fly out of necessity, but Swifts seem to fly for the joy of it, screaming with delight at the top of their little Swift lungs, a shrill cry that is forever associated with English summers.

By the time you read this, a new generation of Sussex Swifts, born in a roof cavity, have crawled to



the nest entrance, and bravely launched themselves on their first flights. And what a first flight - they may not land again for two or three years! For these 'teenage' Swifts, the skies of Europe and Africa will be their playground. Nothing will tame them. Well, not until they meet a partner and decide to settle down in a roof of their own somewhere. But

don't let this comfortable image of domestic bliss fool you - there's no taming these Wild Ones.

Sussex Wildlife Trust is a conservation charity for everyone who cares about nature in Sussex. Founded in 1961, we have worked with local people for over half a century to make Sussex richer in wildlife.


Denise Deegan's "Daisy Pulls it off" – follows the Players' smash hit The Lady in the Van and rehearsals for this summer production in early July are now well under way.



A YouGov poll commissioned by the All Party Parliamentary Group (APPG) on Eye Health and Visual Impairment, and funded by Thomas Pocklington Trust, revealed that 48% of businesses do not have accessible recruitment processes and a shocking 25% of employers said they would not be willing to make workplace adaptations to employ a blind or partially sighted person – despite this being a legal requirement. The polling also found many misconceptions and myths about visually impaired people's ability to work.

Kirstie Thomas, CEO at 4Sight Vision Support commented, "We are delighted to have achieved this quality standard which recognises the benefits of having an inclusive and diverse workforce. We would encourage businesses and other organisations across the county to find out more about achieving it for themselves."

The Certification scheme is free, and on completion, employers will be able to assure others by displaying the RNIB Visibly Better Employer Certification logo.
