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DITCHLING DOWNS WI As it is becoming a bit of a pattern the first Tuesday of the month in October also had awful weather - those who did brave the elements were treated to a very informative and well illustrated talk by Mary Rudling on "Dealing with Poverty in 19th century Sussex" a subject she has been studying for many years.

She told us about the impact of the Old Poor Law of 1601 and then the New Poor Law of 1834. After the New Poor Law, less financial relief was given out, but the Workhouses were seen as the ultimate deterrent. The elderly poor tended to live with their adult children where possible.

During the 18th century the population doubled. Mary informed us about the difference between indoor and outdoor relief - the former was given in poor houses and workhouses and the latter was given to the needy in the parish.

We were fascinated to learn that there was a Poor House in Ditchling too - it had 26 inmates and was situated in the building which is now Pruden Smith Jewellers! Thank you to Mary and to all who attended.



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<u>'LIGHT UP HASSOCKS' – PAST, PRESENT</u></u> <u>AND FUTURE LIGHT UP HASSOCKS (LUH)</u> began in approximately 2011. It provided an opportunity for children to celebrate the coming of Christmas with a parade and switching on the Christmas Lights provided by Hassocks Parish Council. Back then it was coordinated by Hassocks Community Partnership (HCP) which subsequently merged with Hassocks Amenity Association (HAA) to form the present day Hassocks Community Organisation (HCO).

From its earliest inception, LuH contained a marching band, Father Christmas on his sleigh and a children's parade. The timing of late afternoon/early evening on a Friday

early in December was chosen to enable children to take part straight after school.

LuH also offered an opportunity for local charities to publicise the wide range of activities focussed in and around Hassocks and the local environment.

The Sussex Vale Rotary Club (SVRC) assisted with the organisation from 2015 and took over full responsibility in 2018 due to serious difficulty in attracting local volunteers to plan, organise and run the event. SVRC continued as the prime coordinator through to 2020 when Covid prevented LuH being held. In 2021 SVRC shared the responsibility for organising with the HCO, and handed over full responsibility to HCO in 2022.

The challenge for the LuH team in recent years has been to create an event that: Celebrates and entertains the village and its many offerings. Pleases traders and boosts the local economy. Offers something new (as well as old favourites) to residents to encourage them to come out and shop. Is festive and welcomes in the season, and creates some Christmas magic for chil-



dren.

Achieving all these simultaneously is an almost impossible balancing act.

Nonetheless, the LuH Core Team who plan, coordinate and run LuH, have worked hard to improve the event, better reflect the entire community, and respond to the challenges residents have faced in recent times, as well as ensuring that LuH remains true to its original purpose.

Our overriding ambition remains to deliver an event to warm the hearts of local residents. However, the current Core Team is very small and not getting any younger.

We are actively looking for new team members as well as helpers on the night itself so we can ensure that this popular annual gathering can continue and be a real community event fit for the 2020s and beyond.

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<u>NEWS FROM STONEYWISH</u> I have been poring over my textbooks, trying to identify the fungi which are appearing in the Nature Reserve now that the summer rains have, turned into the autumn rains.

A blissful, pearly morning last week yielded a fine crop of shaggy inkcaps, nestling between a birch and a Norway spruce. A downpour soon washed them out and today on a brief foray, I have found the remains of a red-spotted fly agaric, a fresh birch bracket fungus called a razor strop, and a cluster of small, creamcapped toadstools which might belong to any of a number of suspects bearing the caution: Poisonous! The appearance of these 'fruits of the forest' is a delight. They arrive without warning and often vanish within hours - an exuberant reminder in our visible world, of living systems which lie hidden for the rest of the year in the soil or in the fabric of rotting wood. They come with the moist, pungent scents of decaying leaves and berries and the litter of the woodland floor and it is easy to forget that they have work to do beyond providing us with delicacies on toast or decorations for Hallowe'en. Fungi in our culture are intimately associated with death, (dry-rot in houses, tomato blight, and toxic toadstools) but these enigmatic organisms are also crucial for life and health and scientists are only just verifying some of the miracles they perform. We know them as antibiotics and we welcome them to break down our compost, but did you know that the dreaded candida albicans, when living in a well-balanced gut, helps to rid our bodies of heavy metals, such as mercury? And did you know

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that the main bodies of micorrhizal fungi exist in nerve-like networks of threads, called mycelia, which attach to the roots of trees and enable them to nourish and 'talk' to one another? These fungi carry water and food, and warning signals, from root hair to root hair, through the darkness of the forest mulch. True, some fungi attack trees and cull those which are damaged and weak. Epidemics of bugs bearing fungal disease are wiping out whole forests in Canada, where drastic logging practices and climate change have caused environmental stress.

In Sussex, the ash trees are dying and this year the sycamores and maples seem to have joined them. On the Reserve, our lovely sugar maple has been stricken. Horse chestnuts are struggling. Yet there is good news too. At last, western science is catching up with what the poets and primitives have always maintained: intelligence is not confined to the human race! In her courageous stand to preserve old-growth trees and species diversity in British Columbia, the biologist Suzanne Simard has conducted experiments, proving that soil fungi are the life-support system of the forest. By tagging nitrogen particles and water particles, she and her students have proved that trees share their water and nutrients with one another using sheaths of fungal threads as transfusion tubes. Young birch and douglas fir assist one another seasonally, the birch feeding excess nitrogen to the fir trees while they are in summer leaf, and the fir feeding the birch in winter, when the birches are bare. 'Mother Trees' - giants of several hundred years standing - pass sustenance to their seedling offspring, drawing up reserves of water from deep underground and supporting the shallowrooted saplings through times of drought.

In her book 'Finding the Mother Tree', Simard describes with mounting excitement how she discovered that the Mother Trees, give preferential help to their own offspring, i.e. are able to recognise their kin, and that dying trees pump the last of their energy to their neighbours in an attempt to keep the torch of life alight. In scientific terms, this might be called the inevitable transfer of substances from 'source to sink' or rich to poor, by which Nature seeks to maintain its balance. It might also be called Love. The fungi in the



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soil constitute a neural network, just like the nests of nerves in a brain. Information can pass across fungal synapses, so that plants can warn one another of imminent danger. And they do. In other words, they *think*. The forest is not only alive, but intelligent! At the end of the book, comes a joyful recognition of what the indigenous people of the forest had always believed: that trees are not *like* people – they *are* people

The world's aboriginal cultures lived in a state of vital connection to the intelligence of Nature for hundreds of thousands of years. Many native peoples across the world struggle to do so still and it is a sign of how far the developed world - the 'smart' ones - have drifted from that 'connection', that they need scientific proof before they can even believe such intelligence exists. Modern *homo sapiens*, claiming sole rights to intelligence, feels little need of natural wisdom. We are no longer attuned, attached to the Community of Life which is our birthright. We struggle to replicate the patterns of sharing and tolerance which comes naturally to trees, but we are outsiders still, sitting in judgement, plotting and planning to our own advantage.

In bleak moments I feel we are, by our own choice, exiles, ex-communcants from the Feast of Life. Even the current popular longing for Nature can descend, all too easily, into a kind of nature-tourism, which leaves us peering at beauties and secrets and appropriating them in data-banks, rather than according them their own sovreignty.

We call this era the 'Anthropocene'? Does that not say it all? The three-thousand year old redwoods and whales and the earwigs do not know that they live in a figment of our imagination. They live in Big Time, which has sustained Life since the beginning. Why should any other creature believe that man is central to that? Come to that, why should seaweed, or fungus, or rocks or rivers? To them we might more properly represent a dead zone, a numb zone, unable to receive their vital messages. We might be the deaf ones, the blind ones, the self-excluded ones, who spread a blanket of deadness over everything we touch. Look at the wastelands with which civilization has to date surrounded itself – from the Roman copper mines, to the slag-heaps of the Victorians, the shale-oil fields and lithium deadlands, the wind-turbine graveyards of the present day, not to mention the ailing and

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
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improverished communities of our own fellow humans, cut off from compassion and understanding. Our own bodies and hearts shrink at the prospect. Shamans, poets, visionaries have tried, over the centuries to heal the broken threads which once tied us all together.

Is it too late to trace a way back? I do not mean we should go back to swinging through the trees, or knapping flints, but perhaps we could find a way to open our ears and eyes to the humming, singing, zinging, heart-bursting vibrancy of Life Over There! The hunter-gatherer Bushmen of the Kalahari lived in pure 'communion' with their world, until contact with modernity swept it all away. Yet Bushman was not the term they used to describe themselves. They called themselves rather The Harmless People, The Worthwhile People, The People who have Left their Weapons Somewhere Else. Even in their current plight as vulnerable shanty dwellers, they keep to the Old Way of their ancestors, supporting one another and sharing what little they have amongst their kin. They weave a mycelium of love. Live like trees. What would happen if we post-exile people did likewise and used the pathways of our brains, (brains not internet - that's a different matter!) as soil fungi do, to become helpers, conduits for life? Could we, by healing things quietly underground, make a difference? Rosemary

HHD U3A Stories of Polar exploration feature many legendary names but the HHDu3a's Monthly Meeting learnt of other important but lesser-known pioneers. In 1819 Captain William Smith, his ship blown off course while sailing south round Cape Horn, spotted uncharted territory which he named King George Island. Intrigued Royal Navy Officer Edward Bransfield wanted to explore further and was the first to set eyes on the mainland of the Antarctic continent. It took hundred years before others, James Ross, Francis Crozier, Ernest Shackleton, Robert Falcon Scott and Roald Amundsen, returned to the challenge. This was

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always dangerous. Appalling conditions turned back Shackleton, he said he preferred to be 'a live donkey' rather than 'a dead lion', only for him to die on his fourth expedition to the region.

Even greater drama was played out in the race between Scott and Amundsen to be the first to reach the South Pole. Scott did get there only to find that Amundsen had already claimed the prize. Demoralised Scott's team turned back but fierce blizzards trapped them in their tent: starved, suffering from scurvy, hypothermia and frost bite in March 1912 they died, just 11 miles from a food depot.

This fascinating story was told by historian Michael Smith.

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SUSSEX PATHFINDERS RAMBLING CLUB

Whether they are soft, thorny, pendulous, evergreen, deciduous or showing their stark skeletal outline the beauty of trees are there to delight residents and visitors to East and West Sussex throughout the year.

However, less than a 20 minute drive from home I recently discovered a magnificent display of trees I never knew existed.

Quercus ilex, the evergreen oak, holly oak, or holm oak is a large evergreen oak native to the Mediterranean region.

Ilex Way, an avenue of holm oaks was conceived as an impressive carriageway over a mile long, stretching from Goring Hall to St Mary's Church, Ferring. The trees are known for their resistance to sea winds, making them a perfect fit for the winter climate in Sussex.

They faced being cut down by the council in the early 1980s. Angry residents formed the Ilex Group and fought the proposal to fell the trees and were ultimately successful. (Hurrah!)

And so it was that the Sussex Pathfinders were able to gather at the eastern end of Ilex Way on a cloudy, humid – but so far dry Saturday. The avenue of trees with their contorted trunks and dusty evergreen canopies of leaves sheltered us all the way to Ferring.

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Once on the foreshore we were soon aware of the delights of the Blue Bird café selling coffee, assorted cakes and ice cream to the delight of us walkers. However, our walk had not yet finished, and the rain had arrived so we donned our waterproofs, walked along the promenade and finally arrived back in Goring to our starting place and those beautiful holm oaks.

SPRC has another coastal walk with some urban interludes taking place on Sunday, **3rd November** starting from Marine Drive, East Wittering. It will be a 'Figure of 8' walk starting at 10 am and 1.30 pm Chose whether to walk 6 miles or 5 miles or both.

Other November walks are Saturday, **2nd November** at 10 am, 5,5 miles from Washington including the South Downs Way.

Saturday, **9th November** at 10 am start, 5.5 mile downland walk from Alfriston. As it's Remembrance Weekend there is a possibility of being able to view the Bloomsbury Group paintings in Berwick church.

JAYS Each autumn a lot of my conversations go like this: "This morning I saw a weird pink and blue bird on my lawn." Me: "It's a Jay." "There's a parrot on my bird table!" Me: "It's a Jay." "I've just seen... " Me: "It's a Jay". Spotting such an exotic looking bird in the back garden gets even my most wildlifeaverse friends reaching for the Blencowe bird identification hotline. Yet despite looking like it has flown in direct from the jungles of Costa Rica, the

Jay lives in Sussex all year round. For most of the year it withdraws to the woodlands and leads an elusive life amongst the leaves. But in October it is time for the Jay to step out of the shadows.

Jays look fabulous. With extravagant pink plumage, a drooping black moustache and a snazzy electric blue flash through the wings, it's no surprise that the eminent

Sussex naturalist, W.H. Hudson, called it 'the British Bird of Paradise'. Surprisingly, it's a member of the crow family. But while the related Ravens, Rooks, Crows and Jackdaws all wear black funereal feathers, the Jay obviously didn't get the memo about the dress code! Gather the Crows for a family portrait and the Jay stands out like Danny La Rue in full drag amongst a crowd of coal miners. But, when the Jay opens its beak, it reveals its family heritage. The song of the Jay is a rough, rasping, nails-down-theblackboard shriek, which would make any Crow proud.

The reason we see more Jays in the autumn is because they are busy. Jays are nuts about acorns and at this time of the year their favourite food is in plentiful supply. But the Jay is a clever bird. Aware that

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there are lean times ahead it starts making a longterm investment for surviving the winter. With up to nine acorns jammed in its beak and throat, the Jay flies far from the woodlands and hides these nuts in nooks and under dead leaves. With an impressive ability to remember exactly where he has stashed them, the Jay will return, and tuck into these lifesaving larders in the cold days of winter. I've employed a similar strategy many times at parties!

Faced with a full buffet at the start of the night, I hide a few piles of crisps and vol-auvents behind curtains and cushions to help me get through the evening.

One Jay can store up to 5000 acorns in a season. Not all are remembered and retrieved and from these lost acorns, mighty Oaks grow. I often wonder how many of the huge Oaks we see in Sussex were originally planted by Jays. Through the cen-

turies these birds have been architects of the English countryside: a landscape created by the forgetfulness of a pink crow.

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STEVE'S BACK PAGE GOSSIP

In the late 1970's because of the continuous flooding in Dale Ave and Keymer Road it was decided by the local authority to put in a new pipe to help with the problem which started at the foot of the Downs in Ditchling. Chalk streams took the water from Beacon Road across the fields to Lodge Lane, whereby means of other pipes and open streams it flowed under Highlands Close and its junction with Willowbrook Way and through the gardens on the north side of Dale Avenue until it reaches the car park behind the supermarket, which was then Keymarket. From this point it was decided to install a new pipe which would be approximately 4 ft in diameter and run it in front of the Orion Parade shops in Dale Avenue and under Keymer Road to the entrance of Willmington close. It then turns under the service road to the rears of the shops and passes underground to Grand Avenue and continues between the rear of the shops and No 1 Grand Avenue, where it meets the mainstream, thus preventing torrents of water from flowing down the high street and causing a lot of damage.

However, the issue we're having is where it comes into Wilmington Close and then turns down the entrance to our service area, at this point the road is beginning to subside mainly because it's at the top of the gradient and the pipe is at the deepest which means whatever they used to pack around the pipe probably sand and gravel is no longer doing its job. The same problem also happened in the 80s, but then a team of workers with heavy machinery arrived and sorted the problem out in no time at all. But these days it has to be somebody's fault, it can't just be that over the years wear and tear and heavy traffic have caused the problem. The road is a service road for the shops flats and houses that have garages and entrances onto the service road.

So special materials should have been used in the first place to ensure this didn't happen, it's already a trip hazard and a danger to low cars. I'm surprised somebody hasn't tripped yet, so they can sue the council for loads of money, also if it sinks any further then the huge wall on the corner which has behind it tonnes of earth and water could come down to. Trouble is everyone has to play the blame game, I have to have deliveries to stay in business so it's my fault because of the delivery lorries, but let's not forget the huge refuge lorries that come down twice a week, you could go on and on. The responsibility lies with whoever owns the pipe and put it in in the first place and don't forget I can almost stand up in this pipe, it's massive, and the amount of water that flows through it is incredible. I went down the inspection hatch once to see what it was like, I wanted to see how far I could get along it but after 100 yards claustrophobia got in the way and I turned back. Light Up Hassocks this year is on the 6th December - let's hope it's a bit more of an even split this year and not all at one end.

I'm not sure how this new bins rota is going to work but if you get a build-up of rubbish and can't face the bureaucracy of Burgess Hill dump, although it is a bit further, you can always go to Lewes, you don't have to book, it doesn't matter where you come from and you can take almost anything there - they are great bunch of lads and will help you, you can take a trailer as long as it's no bigger than 6 ft by 4 ft.

I've still got nothing to report on the eyesore over the road except that one day it will probably be flats with shops underneath but when work is going to start on that is probably a long way off yet.

Before I go, I'd just like to congratulate R.D. Jenkins who are regular advertisers in this magazine on their excellent job they did on the damaged flint wall opposite Ditchling Pond. It can't have been an easy job putting all those bits of flint back together but credit where credits due – Well done lads!

Can't believe it's nearly Christmas again - where does that time go? Wonder what next year is going to bring? Love you all Steve
