

<u>CUCKOO: SOUND OF SPRING</u> It's become a tradition of mine to go camping locally for a few nights in May. Being emersed in nature, spending evenings by firelight, and absorbing the abundant buzz of wildlife; it's a good-for-thesoul time to be outdoors in Sussex.

Hawthorn, or the May tree, is flowering in fragrant blooms. Bats are flitting enmasse from maternity roosts at dusk to forage. Badgers are on the trundle and Foxes on the trot. And yes, there are loads of lovely baby bunnies. In Sussex, we are lucky to retain a population of visiting Nightingales, and on uninterrupted May nights the males are in full rattling, palpitating symphony. Tawny Owls ke-wik and Barn Owls shriek. Woodlands burst into carpets of indigo as Bluebell scent fills the understory.

Amidst this, an undulating 'beep-boop' can be heard, a natural metronome. It is one of our most recognisable bird calls, and the onomatopoeic sound of spring and summer, the Cuckoo.



Arriving from Africa in March, Cuckoos infamously lay their eggs in other birds' nests, sneakily replacing an egg of an unsuspecting parent for them to incubate, feed and fledge. The not-so-little Cuckoo nestling shunts other eggs, and even youngsters, out of the nest, outcompeting any remaining for resources, becoming the last chonky chick standing. Regularly hoodwinked are Reed Warblers, Dunnocks and Meadow Pipits.

Mostly insectivorous, with a penchant for Hairy Caterpillars, adult Cuckoos spend their days feeding prior to their homeward migration. Having not had chicks to rear and fledge, they leave around June, with the new generation following later in summer.

Overall, it sounds like Cuckoos are having a pretty easy time of it. However, as is the story of so many of our native species, they are under threat. Cuckoos have declined by 65% since the 1980s and are now on the UK conservation Red List. The usual suspects are at play of habitat loss, climate change, and pesticide use resulting in food scarcity. Additionally, these issues have befallen many of their host species, leading to similar population declines, or, at the least, Cuckoo-bewildering behaviour changes such as earlier breeding.

Despite their size and familiarity, these elusive birds are not an easy spot. In a second act of mistaken identity, their barred chest can often resemble that of a Sparrowhawk. Although their calming calls have accompanied many a spring sundowner for me, I'm still yet to see one myself. Perhaps this year could be my year. Maybe.

The May event - On **8th May** we will be screening Lee (2023), Director Ellen Kuras, starring Kate Winslet). This is one week later than our regular night due to County Council elections in the Village Hall.

Lee Miller's granddaughter Ami Bouhassane, Co-Director of the Lee Miller Archives at the Farley Arts Trust will be joining us too for a Q&A session.

Don't miss it! It will be a privilege to hear Ami talk about her grandmother's life and work and answer our questions.

We are also very grateful to Anthony Penrose of the Farley Trust for offering to waive their normal performance fee for our event, however a donation from every ticket sold will go to the Trust.

In Lee, Kate Winslet stars as Lee Miller – the fashion model turned war photojournalist for British Vogue. The film shows Miller as she "documents war as historical evidence". As a female war correspondent at that time, she was barred from entering active battle zones but none the less was not spared from witnessing and recording moving and horrific scenes beyond the areas of immediate combat.

Lee Miller works along side Life Magazine photojournalist David E. Scherman, played by Andy Samberg. They worked on many shared assignments, including

documenting the horrors of the Nazi concentration camps at Buchenwald and Dachau. Scherman's iconic photograph of Miller sitting in the bathtub in Adolf Hitler's private apartment in Munich, with the dried mud of that morning's visit to Dachau on her boots deliberately dirtying Hitler's bathroom, - was taken in the evening of 30 April 1945, coincidentally the same day that Hitler committed suicide. After posing for the bathtub photograph, Miller took a bath in the tub and then slept in Hitler's bed.

After the war Miller fought hard against the repression of her confronting war images in a world that preferred to forget the atrocities that had taken place.

That Miller's work is known today is mainly due to the efforts of her son, Antony Penrose, who has been studying, conserving, and promoting his mother's work since the early 1980s. Never having known about her war work while she was alive, Penrose later discovered sixty thousand or so photographs, negatives, documents, journals, cameras, love letters, and souvenirs in cardboard boxes and trunks in the attic of Farley Farm, the family home.



NEWS FROM STONEYWISH As though by magic, the world has become green again and I find myself feeling ridiculously happy and seized with a childish desire to go out and play. The same thing happens every year. It makes no difference that each spring finds me older and creakier than before, or that the games I dream of were old-fashioned even in the far-off days I remember. Suddenly I want to do hopscotch, whip-and-top and French skipping - which involved tying hundreds of rubber bands together and stretching them in a kind of cat's cradle from the front gate; then trying to jump in and out without falling over.

There is something intoxicating about the juxtaposition of green and blue (whether it is a distant downland horizon, or young leaves seen against the sky) which brings on an involuntary *joie de vivre*. The joys of Spring! That sense of jumping for joy is there in the very word Spring! One week the world is drab – a scumble of bistre and muddied pigments like a first attempt in watercolour - then Nature cleans her brushes, dips into dazzling emerald and gold, drops in an azure sky. The transformation unfolds with each species of flower and tree coming to life in turn as though attuned to hidden cues, but all are under starters orders - spring is happening NOW. The accumulating rush of energy is a tremendous force. I remember leaning my head against a young ash tree some years ago and hearing, to my amazement, the sound of a torrent surging inside the trunk. It was spring, and I was eavesdropping on the roar of the first sap rising. It sounded as though a dam had burst. Small wonder then that the combined force of the green world stirring can affect us physically and lift our spirits too.

In Russia and the Baltic States, the nectar-sweet flow of spring sap was traditionally tapped from birch trees and drunk with lemon or made into a health-giving wine. In the woods of Wisconsin, the same technique was used on sugar maples to collect their sap, which was then boiled down to make maple syrup. One had to have an ear closely attuned to the trees to catch the right moment.

From ancient times people held festivals to help the spring along. Songs and dances were once performed in all cultures to celebrate life's rebirth - the sprouting of seeds, the laying of eggs – an end to hungry times and the ordeals of darkness and cold.

Even today, though we can pass winter in relative comfort, a sense of relief rises from deep within us at the first sign of green. And though we may be too busy or too distracted to acknowledge it, our nerves and cells still respond to millions of signals from the 'wild', which pass below the radar of the intellect, encouraging us to join the party. Armed with the most sophisticated listening devices, the scientific mind can make little sense of these signals and invitations, being deafened by the noise of its own static, for Nature's messages do not speak to reason, but address themselves directly to the primal parts of ourselves which civilisation has suppressed and driven out.

The heart however, recognises even infinitesimal vibrations from its native realm and welcomes affinities that draw us closer to the beating heart of the cosmos. Some signals occur at a molecular level, too subtle to be felt. Some are electromagnetic, deriving from invisible parts of the spectrum. Some, like the scents and properties of plants, occur at a sensory level. All affect our mood, vitality and health. By being open to their influence, a person can enter into a world of infinite possibility.

Earth feels suddenly dynamic and alive. Yet for centuries, the West has been distancing itself further and further from the seemingly erratic and unpredictable world of Nature, rewriting the



script, redesigning the set, recasting the characters till reality is reduced to a governable form.

Machines have made possible an assault on every wilderness, including the interior of the human psyche, and humans have claimed conquest at each encounter.

Finally, dazzled by success, Technocratic Man and Woman are subjugating their whole species to the reductive requirements of machines and turning from vital to Artificial Intelligence under the illusion that speed is better and profit for all, a potential.

The real world is rapidly becoming a dead zone – an inert and uniform resource for the commodification of what was once ecstatically alive. Life will be more 'secure', more 'ordered', less unreliable than before.

Or will it? People watch the fabric of Nature collapsing before their eyes. Their health hangs by a thread. They are rushing to oblivion but cannot change course. The truth is that it need not be this way. And our own inner wisdom knows it. Nothing else on the planet is rushing. No other species has opted out of the crazy, perilous, beautiful world that is still governed by the pull of sun and moon and that sets all life in motion.

There is no real reason why *homo sapiens* could not lay aside the assumption that some humans are inherently superior to others and that all humans are superior to the rest of Creation. We could engage with one another and with everything on our planet in a respectful and patient way. We could share in the gifts of Nature, instead of merely counting the casualties.

The Earth is a watery planet and we are oceanic beings. 70% of the Earth is covered by the sea. Water constitutes 70% of our bodies and the balance of salts and minerals in seawater is mirrored in our own tears and bathes and nourishes our cells which began their evolution in the sea. Water courses through earth's landscape and all its life forms. With rivers as arteries and networks of capillary streams, it runs through the veins of leaves, and the threads of soil fungi, heaving and falling with the movements of the moon. It circulates the earth in an endless cycle and we are all vessels in the chain of flow.

A cottonwood tree, it has been noted, can transpire 100 gallons of water *per hour* into the atmosphere. It can also draw up water from deep underground and hold it just below the soil's surface overnight, where it nourishes shallower rooted plants. Pumping moisture into the air, forest trees provide their own clouds and rainfall. The water which courses through a tree, has already travelled through innumerable other plants, humans and animals, oceans and aquifers, making no distinction between them. Being part and parcel of this one great whole, why should we not treat all things as kin?

We can hardly begin to feel the astonishing complexity of life until we do so. There are trees that have been growing for over 10,000 years.

In the United States a grove of suckering aspen trees share a root system which covers 106 acres. A wayside herb might have lived undisturbed for hundreds of years and seeds have survived burial for thousands. All have wisdom to teach. All are connected. Why should not we be connected too? As spring returns, we are called to join the dance. The lambs certainly feel it. They are coming thick and fast at Stoneywish and the joy of living lifts them off the ground in impulsive skips and bounds – all four feet at once! If you can't play hop-skotch, find a tree and be with it long enough to let it lift you up... You will not regret it.
