RESIDENTS 27th September is the 200th Anniversary of the opening of the Stockton and Darlington Railway and Railway 200 is the nationwide celebration marking 200 years of the modern rail-

Hassocks grew up around the station which opened in 1841, and Hassocks wouldn't be the village it is today without the station. In 1881 the 1841 station building was replaced by a grand Victorian station building. In 1972 this was replaced by a prefabricated modular structure which had a shelf life of 25

In 2000 the Hassocks Rail Group was formed to campaign for a new station and in July 2013 the new station building was opened.

Hassocks Rail Group is celebrating the 200th anniversary of the railway on 27th September by having a display in the Waiting Room at Hassocks Station of photos of Hassocks Station through the ages, people's memories of travelling by train, keepsake cards with pictures of the old and new stations and a potted history of the different stations to hand out, pictures for children to colour in and a model train set.


> HHD u3a the u3a's Monthly Meeting found us in Brighton in the 1830's. Local historian, Richard Ware, introduced us to Russian poet, Prince Pyotr Vyazemsky, visiting the resort to experience the medecinal qualities of sea bathing only to discover that the waves ressembled 'a mad lion, furious, foaming at the mouth ... it knocks you sideways. Finding his feet in Brighton was also tricky until he met other artistic figures like Lady Morgan, a much-admired pioneering Irish novelist. Pyotr attempted to learn English but complained that it was like 'threading beads with his tongue'. From his stay near the Star and Garter in Kings Road he visited the Royal Pavilion, the German Spa in Queens Park, Devils Dyke, where it rained, and further afield to Worthing and Arundel. There was a wry laugh when we heard how Pyotr admired the good quality of the roads.


> Pyotr came to Brighton at a low time: four sons dying in infancy and many of his friends, like the famous poet Pushkin, also dying young. He lamented how 'I have survived much and outlived many.' But Richard, drawing on Pyotr's diaries, believes that the daily sea-bathing, the stimulation of fashionable society and the sight-seeing meant he left Brighton much happier than when he arrived. HASSOCKS GARDENERS INCREASINGLY ASKING HOW TO COPE WITH DROUGHT, SAYS FAMILY-RUN BUSINESS With the prospect of a dry summer in store for the county, and one water company boss touring the TV studios to tell us to save water, what can gardeners do to protect their plants and lawns this summer?

One family-run garden centre in Hassocks says it's being increasingly asked for help from those desperate to know, without any sign of significant rain in the forecast.

Historically, our region been more vulnerable due to lower rainfall levels and higher population densities, but having seen the driest March in 69 years, and April receiving barely half its usual rainfall, hosepipe restrictions this summer must now be a real possibility", explains horticulturalist Hazel Still from South Downs Nurseries on the Brighton Road.


"Resorting to a hosepipe for the garden can use over a thousand litres of water and cost more than £1.50 per hour. That's the equivalent to a family of four's use across two days", adds Hazel. "Using less water takes pressure off vital water supplies while saving money. But how to keep gardens green and beautiful in dry weather without increas-

of advice, not least that when it does rain the need to collect rainwater; it's free and plants prefer it to tap water. Water butts are ideal here, not just for homes but sheds, garages and greenhouses as well. Plants are also happy with so-called grey water, so consider if you can reuse water from hand washing, washing up, cleaning vegetables, cooking and alike; not forgetting the water running while you are waiting for the shower to get hot.


Make the best use of the water you have by using it early in the morning or late in the evening so that it does not evaporate. Gel crystals can be mixed with the soil in hanging baskets and containers to help retain moisture. Group plant containers together and move them to a shadier spot so they don't dry out so quickly.

Mulch is used by professional growers to both reduce moisture loss and supress weeds. Cover domestic borders and pots after watering with organic matter, gravel or weed membrane.

Lawns turn brown in hot, dry weather but it's best not to water it unless it's newly-sown. Avoid stressing it by close mowing. When the rain returns the grass should recover quickly.

A top-tip is to water plant roots and not the foliage by directing water at the soil around the stems. Prioritise your water: plants in pots need to be watered more than those in the ground. Newly-planted perennials, shrubs and trees need regular watering





through their first season. Soak well: a bucketful of water once a week will penetrate deeper and draw the roots down, making them more drought resis-

"It's about working with nature, not against it, to keep our gardens thriving while protecting precious water supplies," says Benjamin Tate, director of Tates of Sussex garden centres. "With a prolonged dry spell upon us, as gardeners we can play a vital role in water conservation. Simple steps like watering early or late, using mulch to retain moisture, and collecting rainwater can make a real difference". Both advice and helpful products are available from South Downs Nurseries in Hassocks, Newhaven's Paradise Park, Old Barn at Dial Post near Horsham and Portslade's Mayberry Garden Centre.

there is nowhere pristine left? Is it ignorance? Is it criminal neglect? Should we educate ourselves more? Should we blame others? Or is the answer simpler, more radical yet? Suppose we then discovered that the ordinary, common or garden things beneath our noses were more astonishing than we could have possibly believed? Would it release us from addiction to this new-improved, longer-lasting, freshertasting dream of life? Instead of living in a world of that is, what would it be like to enter a world of this is... where the moment was sufficient to itself? Or rather to re-enter it as this, surely, is the world we all knew before we were 'educated'. In this world the ordinary is phenomenal. A daisy is a miracle. A pigeon as fascinating as a hoopoe. Snails, blackberries, dandelion clocks carry patterns of beauty which can stop the heart. Can we learn to cherish these dirt-cheap things before they too are driven onto the endangered list like frogs and turtle-doves before them? Can we cherish them not for any material benefit they bring us, but out of wonder and a sense of kinship? For we are all fragments of life on this tiny planet. It is merely the apotheosis of knowledge and computation ensuring that very few humans are at the party. The party is happening everywhere that mechanistic thinking is not happening. Trading humanity for a Transhuman dream is the ultimate admission that we have lost touch. Subjecting the natural world to scientific experimentation, attempting to force it to cooperate on our terms is an abuse which may one day be recognised with horror. As always, the poets were there before us. To live, as William Blake wrote, 'in eternity's sunrise' is to let every moment be a once-in-a-lifetime, first and last experience in which everything is revealed in its pristine state. From this comes respect and love. To be still, to make space for 'otherness', for not knowing-it-all, establishing superiority, whether in the world at large, or in the back garden, may be the best, the only hope for Man and Nature, both.



We thank Pam Worthington-Williams for the following letter:- Dear Editor, with regard to the photograph of Hurst Carnival in the June issue of Talk About, I showed it to my mother, Mrs Peggy Clark. She is nearly 95 and was born in Hurst, and she recognised the lady in black in the centre of the photo.

She was actually Mrs Sandles, not Sanderson, and she lived in Sayers Common. She was only about 4 feet tall, having very short arms and legs, and when my mother knew her in the mid 1930s she had a cottage east of the A23 and kept ducks and chicken. Although my mother lived in Hurst, she used to visit her gran, Mrs Burtenshaw, in Sayers Common and they used to cross over the A23 and walk over to Mrs Sandles cottage and buy eggs. My mother particularly remembers this as she was allowed to feed the ducks.




same level of skill. The children tried really hard to accumulate as many points they as could from the various putting and chipping activities and we're pleased to say that that we came first out of

UNDER-FIVES WITH MOTOR LEARNING IMPAIRMENTS WILL RECEIVE VITAL PHYSIOTHERAPY SERVICES THANKS TO SUSSEX FREEMASONS Over 80 children with cerebral palsy, chromosome abnormalities and rare genetic disorders across the Southeast of England will receive life-changing physiotherapy services thanks to a generous grant from Sussex Freemasons to the Dame Vera Lynn Children's Charity (DVLCC).

The £60,000 grant will help to fund the salary cost of an additional paediatric physiotherapist. DVLCC works with children with cerebral palsy, rare genetic disorders and chromosome abnormalities, all of whom have physical impairments resulting in global developmental delays. Through

their bespoke therapy services, the charity supports these children to develop basic life skills such as sitting, standing, self-feeding, walking and communicating their needs.

The charity currently supports 83 children per week at their centre in Chailey, East Sussex. Physiotherapy/conductive education is a key service which helps children build their physical strength. With the addition of a new physiotherapist to the team, DVLCC can now look to double the number

of children supported across the next year, ensuring that as many children as possible have access to their bespoke therapy services.

The funding will make a significant difference in the lives of these children and their families. The charity's new paediatric physiotherapist will provide specialised assistance to children, in the form of individualised therapy programmes to develop physical abilities such as balance, coordination and strength. By unlocking their physical potential, this life-changing support can enable them to reach milestones their parents were once told were out of reach.

One in 400 children born each year are diagnosed with cerebral palsy, often caused by bleeding on

the brain, lack of oxygen at birth or infections caught during pregnancy. This can lead to significant developmental delays, with a large proportion of children not reaching traditional development milestones. For many of the children supported by DVLCC, their cerebral palsy diagnosis comes with a range of other conditions, including visual and hearing impairments, speech and language difficulties and issues with eating, drinking and respiration. NHS guidelines demonstrate that the earlier children can access the necessary support, the better their long-term outcomes will be. For some of these children, early intervention can be the difference between taking their first steps or spending a lifetime in a wheelchair. Through their physiotherapy service, DVLCC are supporting families to

overcome huge hurdles in their child's development.

The grant from Sussex Freemasons to the Dame Vera Lynn Charity comes through the Masonic Charitable Foundation, which is funded by Freemasons, their families and friends, from across England and Wales. Glenys Creese, CEO of Dame Vera Lynn Children's Charity, said:

"We're extremely grateful to Sussex Freemasons for their generous grant. Being able to expand our team with a new paediatric physiothera-

pist means that we can support even more children with motor learning impairments in the coming year. Our team work tirelessly to provide children and their families with the best possible support and a grant like this can transform the lives of children under our care."

Sussex Freemasons said:

"We're very pleased we've been able to help the Dame Vera Lynn Children's Charity with their hugely important programme helping children with cerebral palsy and other disorders. The work they do will help children develop basic movement and communication skills that parents have often been told were impossible for their child. The results can be literally life changing."

OF OWLS, LARKS AND HEDGEHOGS I've

always been a night owl. I'm writing this as my creativity kicks in; unhelpfully that's usually around 9 pm. I spent my childhood howling in resistance at those who dared tell me it was bedtime. I would read until 3 am and be virtually dragged from my bed for school in the morning.

Despite what my mother says, it's a real thing. We are genetically predisposed to different chronotypes associated with our circadian rhythm. There are owls (those who wake and sleep later), larks (those who wake and sleep earlier) and ambivalent (those who are more adaptable to sleep pattern changes).

I used to long to wake up earlier and make the best of the day. Especially as a keen birder it would be advantageous. If I ever do it's glorious. The air is different in early morning. There's so much light, so much time. But there are perks to the night too. It's quiet; everyone else is asleep. It's peaceful and less distracting. And the best bit, of course, is watching nocturnal animals.

I live with another owl. Together, we slink about the local nature reserve at dusk. Hushed tones to fit in. Eyes adjusting to the perceived blackness. There is rarely anyone else around. The damp smell of the

reedbeds seems stronger than in the day. The gravel and parched grass crunch louder underfoot. The world feels bigger somehow, yet more tranquil.

We detect dancing bats who whizz past our faces, saving us from nibbling evening midges. We walk directly past Rabbits on meadow buffets, who barely look up to note us. We take in pre-roosting bird calls; Reed Warbler, Song Thrush, Blackbird, Robin, and skyward silhouettes of those returning for the night; gulls, corvids, a Peregrine. A Fox on patrol stops to watch us with an air of disdain; 'It's my turn now'. Once we're out of the reserve we stop at the usual spot, at the usual time, and wait. Then we see it. Squat legs, busy snout and about 5,000 spines scuttle across the car park and along the kerbside dandelions. The Hedgehog crosses the road; it's not busy but it's still a risky game, and I once flagged down a startled mini-bus driver to allow for safe hog passage. The Hedgehog continues along a footpath, and through a fence hole cut by kind urban wildlife heroes.

These sightings feel like treats to which few of us are party. I've not only accepted my nighttime owl form; I completely embrace it. Just don't ask me to make plans before midday.
