

HEROES Sleek muscular physique. Dynamic aquatic killer. Mysterious enigmatic loner. You can see why otters shared the cinema box office with James Bond in the Sixties and Seventies. Otters are natural film stars, the Sean Connery of British mammals (with a slightly hairier chest).

I remember two otter-based films from my childhood. I caught 'Tarka the Otter' at the local Odeon and the superior 'Ring of Bright Water' always won over 'Goldfinger' on the TV at Christmas. From the opening man-meets-otter sequence (both the greatest and silliest scene ever committed to celluloid) through to Val Doonican's closing credits crooning - it's a classic!

But behind the otter's silver-screen celebrity status lies a darker, sadder tale. Wild otters in Britain were in trouble. Throughout most of the last century our rivers and wetland habitats were in a shocking state – polluted,





drained and destroyed. Otters were forced into exile in the far flung corners of Britain. The last Sussex otters struggled on until the 1960s.

And with our heroes out of the picture the bad guys muscled in. American mink, which escaped or were 'liberated' from fur farms, rose to the top of the food chain and terrorised our waterways. These voracious predators attacked our native wetland wildlife, wiping out entire populations of water voles across Sussex.

But this screenplay has a happy ending. Over the past decades we've cleaned up our act and a lot of work has been undertaken to improve rivers and wetlands in Sussex. Otters are wandering, territorial animals – each otter needs 40 km of river to make its home - but projects undertaken by conservation groups such as Sussex Wildlife Trust working with local landowners have provided these connected, wetland habitats. And what is good for the otter is good for us too. By undertaking wetland habitat improvements for wildlife - such as planting floodplain woodland or creating water meadows - our countryside regains its powers as water purifier, erosion controller and flood regulator.

Over the past years footprints, droppings and fleeting glimpses have given tantalising evidence that these mammalian movie stars are attempting a comeback in Sussex after half a century. Recently, night vision trail cameras were rolling and filmed a female otter as she made her Sussex small screen debut - possibly the first time a wild otter has ever been filmed in our county. But the real showstopper came when these cameras later captured footage of one - or possibly two - otter cubs; evidence that otters are breeding again in Sussex. With this dramatic plot twist there is plenty of potential for a sequel. The dream that one day we could see these incredible animals swimming in all the restored and vibrant rivers of Sussex is a step closer to becoming a reality. Michael Blencowe

NEWS FROM STONEYWISH These days after Christmas sometimes seem the darkest, though the davlight is in fact lengthening, little by little. The old country saying goes 'February, black or white' and in parts of the country the snow has come already, while we here have the pleasure of black branches, black ditches and a north wind under the door. All the same, spring changes are afoot. The snowdrops are out. The birds are testing snatches of true song amidst their winter twitter. An optimistic woodpecker drums out across the paddock. And the sap must be rising. Michael sets out before first light to feed the animals and break the ice on the water troughs. The pigs grunt excitedly at the first squeak of his wheelbarrow, which tells them breakfast is coming. The sheep wait in silence. But they have been busy overnight, grazing by moonlight on the nutritious buds which are swelling in the hedgerows. Every day some sheep fail to appear for roll-call and Michael has to scour the field edges, looking for those that have foraged so deep, they have got themselves tangled up. Looking for black sheep in the dark is a challenge for any Bo Peep! But eventually they are all free and accounted for. With a nibble of barley, they go to sit and enjoy their cud. Then straight back to foraging again - the taste of spring is irresistible.

One note on sheep and cud and global warming, in the light of recent media debate. Perhaps, before we blame innocent animals for our own meddling in the earth's climate, we should distinguish between traditional and intensive farming practices. Animals on pasture perform the miraculous feat of turning cellulose, i.e. grass into complex and vital animal proteins. They also husband the land, returning vegetable growth to the soil in their faeces, in a form perfectly designed to support future healthy growth, i.e. plants with their full compli-

ment of minerals and vitamins. This process, requiring no chemical inputs, no animal feed factories, or transport networks, supports the extraordinary biodiversity associated with natural pastures, from wild flowers to butterflies and bees, birds and larger wildlife species. Since grass itself captures significant amounts of greenhouse gases, the methane produced by traditional, pasture fed animals will be reabsorbed in a cycle of a decade or so. According to a report by the Roval Agricultural University some 60% of the world's farms are still small-scale subsistence farms, producing 40% of the world's food supply powered by sunlight. Perhaps climate experts should take another look at this vast body of sustainable land-use before abandoning ancient wisdom and throwing the baby out with the bath-water?


