DOWNLANDS SCHOOL At The Heart Of The Community, Caring For The Environment.

Visitors to Downlands are often in awe of our fabulous setting. With views to the Jack & Jill Windmills and Ditchling Beacon, the students at our school study against a stunning backdrop.

We take looking after the environment very seriously and have a very active Eco Forum (student voice group) and Eco Club run expertly by science teacher Phil Cole.

The Eco Club mark Waste Week, Walk to School Week, Switch Off Fortnight and they hold many events throughout the year to raise awareness of the importance of our environment in school and in the wider world.

Mr Cole accompanied by Eco Forum members Madhavan Varadharajan, Alex Savuk, Kimberley Payne, Luca Shanahan, Leah Aldridge, Ruby King and Patrick Bates lead assemblies during Waste Week in May in which they reported on a visit that the Eco Club had made to Haulaway Ltd in Hailsham, where much of the school recycling is taken. The students wanted to know what happens to our waste and recycling and reported back to the whole school about why we need to reduce our waste and what should go in what bin! The students had made a video of the trip and remind-



ed the school community that any waste packaging etc could be placed in the school recycling bins unless it was contaminated with food waste.

The Eco Club is also very pleased that the school canteen has decided to replace plastic cutlery with wooden versions. Many students are bringing in packed lunch items with less plastic packaging. These steps, although small, all help with reducing unnecessary waste at school and we urge parents and carers to continue to make this happen.

Students at school are very conscientious about keeping the school looking neat and tidy – but we are not perfect. Every day after lunch Mr Anthony (Site Officer) takes a small group of students and they litter pick – just to pick up the bits and pieces around school that may have been dropped by mistake.

Every term, however, Mr Cole and around twenty students along with Ms Cutress, Mr Urwin complete a lunchtime litter pick of the wider school site including the car parks and around the ATP. It is amazing how much litter we find under the bushes and behind the bike sheds and we would ask that all users from the community who visit Downlands ensure that they take away rubbish with them after use.

As part of the Great British Spring Clean, the Eco Forum team visited Adastra Park for a litter sweep and







collected a surprisingly large number of black sacks full of litter.

Eco club in collaboration with the Gardening Club have become guardians for Mason bees. They have caused a buzz at school and have found lots of food and flowers to pollinate in the garden and beyond. Mason bees are solitary and don't sting so they should be perfect for the school site.

The next exciting event the Eco Club will be marking is Walk to School Week which will be in July - we can't wait as there are competitions all week and fun lunchtime activities.

Our school fields are used by our students throughout the summer as a social space at lunch and break time. We have cricket fixtures for all year groups as well as our annual Sports Day. As part of our curriculum we include Forest School (led by Matthew Stokes) which is essentially outdoor, nature-based learning that focuses on the holistic development of the student. It is brilliant and takes place down in the woods that run along the stream that crosses our fields. Moreover, local community groups such as the Guides, Brownies and Scouts use our fields for their outdoor activities.

We do have one very serious issue that is becoming very unpleasant for all users of our fields. Please, please if you are walking your dog across our fields – and why wouldn't you, it is a lovely walk – please pick up your dog waste. It is very upsetting for everyone



when you accidently step in it, the ball lands in it, you fall or sit in it – please pick it up! Nicki Burston

NEWS FROM STONEYWISH The first summer flowers are appearing in the hedgerows. As May blossoms fade, they are replaced by a froth of elder flowers, honeysuckle, and briar roses, which fill the evening air with their fragrance. The lambs are growing; the high tseet tseet of fledglings resounds from tree to tree. Two days ago I heard the first scream of a swift hunting high above the Black Pond. One might be tempted to think of this idyllic world as something eternal and vouchsafed to us by the millions of years of its evolution. But today the talk is not of continuity but of cataclysmic change. There are silences in the score of our hereditary soundscape: no chatter of swallows today; no whirr of snipe wings; no peewit cries. Within the past twenty years, these birds have abandoned their traditional haunts. The once insistent call of the cuckoo is now a rarity. It is tempting to blame the exodus on global issues - things belonging to the realm of international politics and science, to which we turn, seeking a 'fix' for every ill. The best of us are trying to save the planet. We monitor, measure and manipulate everything around us so as to maintain our own fixed purposes, as though we alone have outgrown the vital process of evolution. Is a species threatened with extinction? Someone must preserve and rescue it. Is the weather out of control? Mankind can cure it. We will do whatever it takes to ensure our immunity from harm and secure the boundless supplies of energy and food we need to maintain our chosen way of life. means rewiring the whole of the rest of the planet, many are now saying, 'so be it.' Am I alone in experiencing a sinking feeling? I recently came across a joke which seems more interesting each time I think about it. Question: "What is the time?" Answer: 'Eternity'; an allembracing concept which puts us back at the heart of any global issue. In other words, everything is both particular in the here and now, and yet universal. As humans, we are so powerful it is hard for us to turn around and feel overwhelmed by something bigger. Yet this might be the most helpful thing we can do. Man is the largest soilmover on the planet. The statistics are staggering. We only have to look around us to see it in action. Man literally moves mountains and at a stroke dismantles the slow and intricate architecture of the web of life. Wherever homo disruptor is busy digging things up. local populations are extinguished and with every minor extinction, a cascade of loss ripples through the wider environment. And it's not just industrial schemes which are to blame. In our own backyards we are forever paving, clearing, rooting things out. With every hedge goes a family of sparrows. And what use is a nest-box on a wall if there are no trees nearby for fledglings to hide and forage in? What use is a butterfly garden, if the caterpillars have no weeds to eat? Such connections are minute but critical. At Stoneywish there are pockets of land which have been 'rewilding' for 25 years. And to go into these areas now is to see the connections at work.

The soil is laced with fungal strands which break down spent vegetation, releasing nutrients for new growth. Communities of plants, sharing common ground, sustain a humming wealth of insect life. There is good hunting for birds; damp cover for amphibians. The air is different. But Nature does not require a whole nature reserve. A patch of brambles will do, or any forgotten corner. An anthill is a world spacious enough to sustain its own unique ecology. When global issues seem overwhelming perhaps it could help to rephrase the eternity joke and say in reply to the question. "Where are we?" Simply: "Everywhere." A grassroots revolution might then replace the urge to 'move mountains' with something gentler, something truly radical; a kind of graciousness holding back, moving up a little, simply to make room for others, and by the same token, making room for a new humanity in ourselves. Given half a chance, Nature heals itself; and watching what happens, rather than contriving what happens brings the spectator a delightful sense of enlargement. "No man is an island, entire of itself," wrote John Donne almost 400 years ago, speaking of the community of man. Today the words carry a new relevance. In the community of Life the loneliness of a depopulating world need not be ours. Extinctions do not know that they are global. Each, wherever it occurs, is uniquely intimate and provincial. This is perhaps the pity. Creatures do not ask to be spared because they are useful or beautiful to us, but because they carry secrets


important to themselves, a shared intelligence which modern man hardly recognises, but which alone sustains the mantle of life on earth. When we humans act as disruptors, dismantlers, we damage an essential part of ourselves. But when we remember our wider existence, cherish here as everywhere, and work within systems which permit a sense of connectedness we can find ourselves blissfully participating in a global 'joie de vivre'. Here endeth...
