**BETTER BIKING: LINKING DITCHLING HASSOCKS & HURST** I wrote exactly a year ago to say that in addition to the improvements for cyclists at Stonepound crossroads further biking improvements were under consideration for the B2116 locally. And I did say, Don't hold your breath....

A year on and there is some further – good – news but once again you'll have to take a deep breath and hold it.

A scheme is now under consideration within West Sussex County Council (WSCC) to make it safer to bike from Hurstpierpoint to Downlands School. More precisely, WSCC designers have just completed a preliminary design for the initial phase of the scheme and the drawings are due to be shared with local stakeholders shortly. I'm trying to ascertain when 'shortly' is.

Detailed design is expected to follow next year (2021) and construction the year after (2022), subject to funding approvals.

One thing you can do now in order to ensure this scheme isn't lost in endless process is to drop a quick email to your local, mid-Sussex and County

ALL CHANGE: HOW THE MID SUSSEX HEALTH CARE WILL DEAL WITH THIS

YEAR'S FLU SEASON Patients of Mid Sussex Health Care doctors practice, will be familiar with our annual flu vaccination programme where we facilitate large numbers of patients on a walk-in basis at Saturday morning and evening clinics across all three of our sites.

Due to Covid-19, we are having to change how we approach and manage this year's flu season. There will be no walk-in clinics this year, ALL vaccinations will be arranged by invitation only, issued via SMS, email, phone or letter. This will allocate a time, day and location for the vaccination. We are therefore asking that patients do not turn-up without having received an invite or try to book their own appointment.

All patients in the 'at risk' groups, such as the over 65's and those in high risk clinical groups will be seen first. A full list of who this covers will be on our website.

The vaccination programme will run from the end of September, running through until November, there will be a mix of evening, weekday, morning and afternoon clinics as well as weekend clinics. There will also be separate clinics for children.



Where possible patients will have appointments at the surgery they are registered with.

What about the 50-65 age group? The Government has advised that the flu vaccination will now cover patients aged 50 - 64 years due to Covid-19. Patients within this bracket and in at risk groups will be invited to our first run of clinics.

Once we have safely completed our at risk categories, subject to being able to acquire further vaccines - we will start inviting the new cohort of patients.

**BABY LOSS AWARENESS WEEK** is an international initiative which runs from 9<sup>th</sup> - 15<sup>th</sup> October. The aim of the week is to raise awareness of an unspoken tragedy which affects many families. Babies die, even in the 21<sup>st</sup> century. In our culture many people find it very difficult to talk about death, and the death of a baby (before or after birth) is an experience which is rarely spoken of.

The circumstances of loss vary widely and include miscarriage, ectopic pregnancy, compassionate induction (ending a pregnancy due to very complex medical issues), stillbirth or death after birth (expected or unexpected). Each of these little lives, sometimes described as a "missed beginning", impacts the life of the family in many ways. Profes-





sionals involved can also be deeply affected. The aim of Baby Loss Week is to provide an opportunity for those affected to gain support, to provide (if they wish) an opportunity to speak of their child/children and their experience of loss, and to increase awareness in the community. As part of this week, a global event takes place at 7pm on **15<sup>th</sup> October**, known as the Wave of Light. Taking place at 7pm local time everywhere, to create a wave of light around the globe, the idea is that you light a candle and leave it burning for at least 1 hour to remember all babies who have died too soon.

Last year for the first time a public Wave of Light event was held in Keymer. The feedback was that those who attended found it moving and supportive and so it is hoped that this can become an annual event.

The event will be jointly organised by Angie Bowles, a local independent midwife who has a special interest in supporting parents dealing with loss and Father Alex Baxter, Rector for our parish. It will be held at Keymer church (St Cosmas and

St Damian). The event is free of charge and open to those of all faiths and none. We will welcome individuals and families who have been directly affected as well as their friends and those involved professionally in various capacities. The Wave of Light event will be an informal event at which those who wish to will have an opportunity to speak their child's name, but if you prefer you will be able to simply attend and sit quietly and privately. Candles will be provided and will be lit as part of the event.

Of course this event may be impacted by any change in national guidance about socially distanced gatherings. Currently we can welcome 30 people, and you will be asked to wear a mask. Subject to changing guidance, we hope to be able to invite you to stay for light refreshments and a time to talk.

**CELLED** It is with deep regret that for the safety and wellbeing of all concerned, we have decided that we have to cancel this year's Family Bonfire & Fireworks.

We have undertaken a Risk Assessment based on

THE TALE OF AN ARTFUL DODGER Three weeks ago, as I was quietly taking tea in the garden, I heard someone urgently ringing the doorbell and thinking it must be another Amazon driver seeking directions in our confusing neck of the woods, found a young woman on the step, cradling a large cardboard box in her arms. Hannah, an ardent nature lover from just up the road, had been walking down East End lane with her dogs and infant son, when they came across a solitary duckling, running as fast as tiny, day-old legs would carry him and calling wildly for his mother. After depositing her son and dogs safely with her mother, Hannah joined a (by now) collective effort to corner the runaway and save him. After putting up a brave fight, the duckling submitted to capture and, since our ponds were the nearest and seemed therefore the most likely home of any vagrant family of ducks, Hannah brought the foundling to us. In Michael's boyhood, chicks which hatched out in the farmyard in late summer were known as 'blackberry chickens'. Free-range bantams are good at finding obscure nest-sites and emerging with a troop of freshly-hatched chicks, right under



the noses of unsuspecting owners. Blackberry chicks, however, have uphill work to grow fast enough to meet the rigours of approaching winter. Blackberry ducklings face a similar challenge. The duckling in the box had been separated from his siblings in some local catastrophe. He was possibly the sole survivor for we have no others of that age on the Reserve and none have been located elsewhere in the village. His best hope for survival was a term of captivity with us till he had grown feathers and was strong enough to venture out alone. We rigged up a box in the kitchen with a wine fermenting heater as a foot-warmer underneath, a salad bowl to swim in and crumbled up duck food from the Visitor Centre. 'Quackers', as he was now called, plopped straight into the water and, like a little coracle, executed the neatest manoeuvres, while continuing to protest loudly at the curtailment of his freedom. Any outside sound reminded him that he was NOT where he belonged, so he would call for help from geese flying overhead, or siskins, hopping and cheeping in nearby birches. Even passing aeroplanes, seemed a worth an S.O.S. Within two days he was too big for the salad







bowl and we rigged up a big puppy cage, with a plastic trug for swimming and rocks and miniature logs for balance practice. By now, having doubled in size, he could do arabesque stretches, perching on one leg on his miniature rock island; he could preen himself and flap his rudimentary wings as a sign that he was alert and ready for action. And then, as I learnt to my cost, he discovered the art of underwater swimming - a vital life-skill for ducklings to evade predators. This necessitated an impressive amount of splashing and was executed with a kind of mischievous enthusiasm as though he knew he was splattering all my cookery books and slopping large puddles on the floor. His panic and indignation at being approached or handled when his water was changed and his cage cleaned out grew ever stronger. Quackers was never going to be tame which seemed his best hope for survival. Eventually the mayhem in the kitchen became too much to bear and in the swelter of our August heat-wave I spent two days constructing him a run inside our chicken run, with a grand new paddling pool, a slate-tiled preening area, a miniature lawn of turfs and the original cage for shady feeding and safety at night. The whole was double





or triple fenced to keep the duckling in and chickens out. At last we were ready for the move. Ouackers made a tour of his new environment. chirping the lyrical under-song which usually meant he had found his food and was momentarily content. I checked him ten minutes later and he was afloat in his paddling pool. Ten minutes after that he was pecking at dried leaves on his lawn. A little while later it began to rain and I checked again, as he had never seen rain before. Quackers had gone. It had taken him about half an hour to make his escape and though I hunted and listened for him, I knew that once he was in the wild, there would be no chance of ctching him again. On every side of the hen-run stretched dry ditches and brambly scrub, fences, wild terrain which might harbour cats, foxes and innumerable other duck foes. I explored as far as I thought he might reasonably have gone and then gave up. How would I explain to Hannah that I had lost her orphan? I wanted to be grown-up and philosophical. A duck is a duck and most ducklings are no more than juicy snacks for other creatures. Quackers' plump little body would certainly make a succulent lunch for a carnivore! What struck me most was the reckless hunger for

freedom, which had made him reject all help. In that bundle of fluff was an iron determination to be what he was born to be and to hell with precaution. At four o'clock that afternoon, Michael came back to the house shouting: "Come quick! Your duckling is on the Big Pond!" Sure enough there he was, very pleased with himself, dodging the spiteful dabs of other ducks and scuttling right under the feet of the geese when they came ashore for corn. Had he followed the voices he had studied during his imprisonment? Now I felt at peace. If he copped it that night, he had at least achieved his ambition. He had known what it was to be a wild duck and perhaps all that preparatory splashing and jumping in the kitchen cage would stand him in some kind of stead. Next morning he was back again. This time the geese even seemed to offer him some protection, keeping bigger ducks at bay. The next day, independent of any help, he had taken himself off to the Black Swan Pond, to explore a wider territory. It is now a week since the 'great escape'. Almost the size of a pigeon, and not vet feathered, he still sports baby yellow spots on his back. But he is now faster and cockier than any of the other birds which come at feeding time.

Once replete, he sails off to his own private business on the hidden side of the pond and no, he doesn't want to come any closer than that to human two-leggeds...ever again! According to Buddhist belief, all encounters provide us with teachers on life's journey, so as one who is always looking for metaphors, I cannot help finding great consolation in this story. When all around are propounding a reduction in our joie de vivre as a trade-off for for health and safety, Quackers' insane trust in the call of Mother Nature has a heroic do-or-die ring to it! Once upon a time, we were terrified of Tawny Owls. They were a portent of evil in fairy tales, folklore and just about every scary story, film or poem that needed a creepy cliché. But in today's

crowded marketplace of international terrorism, climate change and saturated fats the owl's powers to scare us are fading. Recently, it appears this spokesman of the supernatural has got itself a new publicist. Its modern image is one of a cuddly pinup, more Harry Potter than Hammer Horror.

But stand in the woods on a moonlit night and listen for an unseen owl's ethereal call. It's an ancient, unnerving sound that still speaks to something buried deep within us and ignites a primeval fear. The Tawny Owl is the largest and commonest of our island's five owl species, typically nesting in holes in old trees in our remaining woodlands. But what is it about this bird that has given us the willies throughout history? Let's start with those huge, lifeless black eyes that seem to stare into your very soul. An owl's eyes are not spherical but tubular like two telescopes and give amazing vision at low light levels. However, the eye's stretched shape and position on the owl's face presents a narrow field of vision. To compensate, a Tawny Owl has special bones and blood vessels in its neck so it can perform that freaky, Exorcistlike head twist. This gives the bird the ability to scan all around without having to move their bod-

ies and arouse detection by prey.

And in the world of a nocturnal hunter, silence and stealth are everything. Special serrated feathers slice the air, allowing it to fly as silently as a phantom and aerially ambush its victims. Incredible hearing achieved by asymmetrical ears allows them to accurately pinpoint the rustle of a nervous vole below. They can hear fear.

And then there's that disembodied voice arising from the darkness. The male's far-carrying baritone 'hooo-huhuhuhooo' and the female's squawky 'kerr-wik' response are like a mis-matched duet between Johnny Cash and Janet Street-Porter. These calls help establish, maintain and defend a breeding territory and from October the birds are at their most vocal. Of course, Tawny Owls really couldn't give two hoots about scaring us but throughout history these spectral calls have provided a soundtrack to our deepest fears. In a society which is becoming increasingly detached from nature, it's time to get out into the woods this Halloween and allow ourselves to be unsettled once again by these mystical birds.

#### LOCAL CHARACTERS

I wonder if anyone can recall two eccentric ladies who before the last year lived at 'Little Washbrooks', Hurstpierpoint? Known to the 'locals' as Sister Mary Anselm and Sister Johanna, they were devout Catholics and at one time had intended to take holy vows, but finding the training too demanding, decided to serve God in some other way.

With this in mind they established their own exclusive Sisterhood, and designed and tailored costumes that closely resembled a nuns habit. To the best of my memory the apparel consisted of a grey worstead garment trimmed with a white sash, collar and headband, the severity of which was offset by a chunky rosary that hung nearly to the waist. When dressed in this outfit they really looked quite splendid and in due course became very well known figures in Hurstpierpoint and the surrounding area, especially at the nearby Catholic church where they involved themselves with flower arranging, charitable activities and general parish business. But as busy as they were, the Sisters still felt unfulfilled, and believing that more could be done for the community, founded a private day school for boys and girls at "Oak Lodge", a large Victorian house in Woodsland Road, Hassocks. Although run on Catholic





principles, the establishment welcomed all denominations and a fair number of pupils were enrolled, some of whom lived a considerable distance away, and many of these would be collected early each morning by Sister Mary in her little "Austin Seven", transported to school, and returned home again in the afternoon.

The accompanying photograph was taken in the front garden of Oak Lodge in1938, and I can identify some of the children in the group. For instance, the little boy on the extreme left in the front row is Gerald Towner who used to live in one of the cottages in Station Approach East, while the two lads with "pudding basin" haircuts are Miles and Austen Pruden, sons of Dunstan Pruden, the Silversmith from Ditchling Common. My brother Pip is there to, standing behind the little girl with a handkerchief tucked up her sleeve, and many other faces are tantalisingly familiar, but their names escape me now. For some reason the school closed at the outbreak of the second world war, and later on, the Sisters who had been such good companions, suddenly parted company. What caused the separation and what became of Sister Johanna I never knew. But Sister Mary had been a closer acquaintance and continued to visit us from time to time, although it was never quite the same. Then one day in mid 1945, a strange and pale looking lady with cropped grey hair knocked on our front door and said she had come to say goodbye! She looked so different that it took





a moment to realise that it was our old friend dressed in everyday clothes. She said that she had renounced her title and was just plain Mary Anselm again. She also informed us that she had been appointed as Matron to St. Johns College, Northcourt, and would shortly be leaving with the school when it returned to Southsea.

So that was the end of the friendship, for Sadly we never saw or heard of her again, and together with Sister Johanna's earlier departure, the district lost two - admittedly odd - yet nevertheless kindly, interesting and genuine characters.
